On March 1 of the present year the Trade Bulletin showed the American commercial stocks at 52,222,000 bushels and the farmers reserve at 111,000,000 bushels, making a total of 196,000,000 bushels. Now the amount consumed, exported and seeded during the year to March 1 was 569,773,000 and the export for the same period was 61,142,000. The spring seeding in 1904 amounted to 30,000,000 bushels, as estimated, and the winter wheat seeding was 45,000,000 bushels. The amount consumed and manufactured during the year was 453,631,000, making a total for all of 568,773,000 bushels. Now, taking the figures above, the wheat and flour and wheat reserves March 1, 196,-82,000, and taking away the spring wheat seeding, estimated at 22,000,000 bushels, and four months' food, 14,810,000, and exports at the rate of 968,000 a week from January to March, sevence,n weeks, amounting to 18,456,000, and the spring seeding, the total food for four months and the export for seventeen weeks, a total of 191,286,000 bushels, leaves for July 1 of the year the total food for four months and flour of 4,976,000.

Market is Weak and Day's Price Movement is Downward on the Average.

MANY INDUSTRIALS ARE HIGHER

Money is Plentiful and Rate for Call Loans Drop to Two Per Cent-Railroad List is Henvy.

NEW YORK, March II.—The money outlook was the dominant influence on stocks
today and the day's price movement was
downwards on the average. The industrial
stocks and specialties were quite sharply
divergent from the railroad list and furnished quite a large record of advances.
This class of securities is largely dependent
on factors of individual effect, being less
responsible to general developments than
the railroad list.

On the other hand, the heaviness in the railroad list was quite general, although the movement during the day was hesitating and irregular. Prices touched a considerable lover level, however, than yesterday. It was supposed that pools and speculative syndicates were unloading to a considerable extent and there was no doubt that the money outlook was the principal motive for this action. There was a sentimental influence to some extent, as there were very little withdrawal of credits by calling loans, according to the reports of money brokers. There was, however, quite a large paying off of loans on call, which followed the precautionary liquidation of stocks. It was said that a considerable part of the call loans paid off were liquidated with the proceeds of new loans on time. Operators in stocks hitherto have refrained very persistently from taking out time loans, even at the invitingly low level of rates, being natisfied to rely on day to day accommodations. The importance attached to the conditions in the money market was emphasized by the increased weakness developed after the appearance of the preliminary estimates of the week's currency movement. In addition to the \$2,315,000 taken by the subtreasury up to Thursday evening on account of the repayment of government deposits, it is estimated that nearly \$1,000,000 has gone to the interior on the express movement. The apparent loss in cish of over \$10,000,000 is in excess of the surpius reserve as at stood in last week's bank statement.
