

CIVIL SERVICE SWINDLES Omaha Offers a Field for New and Enterprising Crooks.

TWO FORMS DEVELOP IN ONE DAY

Young Men Pay Special Agents for Government Jobs Only to Find They Have Been Duped.


S. L. Ferguson, an employe of one of the South Omaha packing houses, filed a complaint before United States Commissioner Anderson Monday evening, charging one Joseph Warren with impersonating a government agent and separating Ferguson and four other packing house employes from \$35 each, with the promise of securing each a job with the Panama Canal com-The \$25, so Ferguson and his friends were told, was to pay their transportation to Panama, and the only reason for the delay in starting was the nonarrival of the transportation from Wash-

The swindle was uncarthed Friday last. and as a consequence of Warren's work he was discharged from his employment at Armour's. A deputy marshal has been sent to arrest Warren on the Ferguson complaint.

Another Form of Swindle.

A few mornings ago a half dozen young men gathered at the Union station to go out on certain morning trains as supernumerary railway postal clerks. They were directed to Transfer Clerks J. W. Niles and W. B. Hite for further information. It developed that five of the young men had been persuaded to cough up the sum of \$27.50 each wherewith to buy unlforms as railway postal clerks and pay the first premium on their surety bonds before they could be intrusted with the responsibility of handling Uncle Sam's mails in a postal car. They were to work a few days as supernumeraries before

being put on the salary roll. Transfer Clorks Niles and Hite were ewhat confused over the inquiries, and it finally dawned upon them that the young men were the victims of a neatly turned swindle. That is, all but one of them had been euchered out of their \$37,50, and he concluded to bring his cash down to the train with him and get next to the tob before he surrendered the ducats. By a comparison of notes it was found that the young men were all the victims of the same swindler. One of them was from Council Bluffs and the others from a political plum and the club did not want Omaha.
