Several cruises were actually despatched to the rendezvous and many already had fallen into the hands of the Japanese, but Rojostevsky deliberately sacrificed them as pawns in a bigger game.

CLADO MAY HAVE A DUEL

Criticism of Admiralty by Rojostevsky's Officer Leads to Trouble. ST. PETERSBURG, April 8.—A sensational sequence to the newspaper campaign inaugurated by Captain Clado (formerly Admiral Rojostevsky's chief tactician) against Vice Admiral Avellan (head of the Russian Admiralty department) and the general staff of the admiralty may be a duel tomorrow between Clado and Captain Zilotti, the aide of Admiral Avellan.

At the rate the Russian squadron steamed from Madagascar, which averaged eight knots an hour, the greatest naval battle since Nelson's victory at Trafalgar should occur in about ten days. The admiral realizes that Rojostevsky faces great odds, owing to the immense superiority of the Japanese cruisers and torpedo boats, and reliance in his success is based upon seven battleships with which he can oppose Togo's four. It is thought unlikely that the Vladivostok squadron will attempt a junction with the Baltic fleet, though it is quite possible it may make a diversion, undeterred by the fate of the Russia at the time of the egress of the Port Arthur fleet last August.

Says Japanese Retreat.

A dispatch from General Linvitch to the emperor, under today's date, says: "The battle at Tsintautun, April 7, lasted twelve hours. The enemy's losses were heavy from our artillery and rifle fire. JOSIAH STRONG PROTESTS

President of Institute of Social Service Opposes the Rockefeller Gift.

SAYS IT IS A QUESTION OF ETHICS

Legal Rights of Donor and Church Do Not Enter as Matter is Purely One of Morals.

BOSTON, April 8.—Rev. Dr. Josiah Strong of New York, president of the American Institute of Social Service, has joined in the protest of Congregational ministers against the acceptance of the Rockefeller gift to the American board. In a communication to the committee of the protesting clergymen Dr. Strong says:

We are told by those who approve the acceptance of the gift that it is not the business of a church, charitable organization or of any body to sit in judgment on the character of the contributions to its work. This simply belongs to the real estate market, and the church or society that wash its hands of all responsibility touching all gifts which may come to its treasury without violating fundamental principles of ethics?

A man may be possessed of a gift of money, to which he has no moral right in a great variety of ways, but, whatever the method, the principle remains the same—namely, that a man has no right to give that which is not his, and if one has a right to receive a gift which the donor has no right to give, this moral right, which is beyond all possible question, is precisely applicable to the case in hand, and the prudential committee is not vacated by its refusing to recognize it.

LEGAL RIGHTS NOT INVOLVED

It is charged by many that Mr. Rockefeller has acquired large property by his wealth by illegitimate methods and that to such unjust gain he has no moral right. Legal rights do not enter into the discussion. Multitudes believe that a man has no right to give that which he has not a right to receive, and that the donor has no right to give. This moral right, which is beyond all possible question, is precisely applicable to the case in hand, and the prudential committee is not vacated by its refusing to recognize it.

KING CELEBRATES NATAL DAY

He received numerous telegrams of felicitation from sovereigns and other heads of states, and held a reception of the diplomatists and Mr. Swenson, the retiring American minister, conveyed to the king President Roosevelt's congratulations, and as dean, the good wishes of the diplomatic corps.

EDWARD MAY VISIT TANGIER

Report at Marcellis that English King Will Call at Morocco.

MARSELLIS, April 8.—It is expected that King Edward, of Great Britain and Albert, with King George and Queen Alexandra on board, will sail today, although a violent storm in the Mediterranean may delay its departure. The first stop of the yacht will be Port Mahon, island of Minorca. Its ultimate destination has not been disclosed, but the fact that Port Mahon is on the direct route to Tangier, Morocco, gives rise to reports that King Edward may stop at that port. The officers of the yacht refuse all information regarding the destination of the Victoria and Albert.
