This was the first definite statement made by counsel for the plaintiff of the amount that he sought to recover at this trial of the now famous suit. Since that time, whenever the county road fund tax has been levied it has been added to, and now amounts to the sum mentioned. The statutes of the state provided that the fund arising from this tax, though levied by the county supervisors, shall be turned over to the city when collected from property lying within the corporate limits. The fund thus discovered will probably be employed in the improvement of roads abutting the cemetery.


