Russians in Turan Bay. LONDON, April 17.—A special dispatch from Hong Kong says that a portion of the Russian squadron was seen Sunday at Turan bay, about 30 miles north of Kamranh bay.

Railhead Lost Another Ship. NAGASAKI, April 17.—The appeal in the case of the British steamer Nigretia, seized by the Japanese cruiser Tushima December 30 off the coast of Korea and condemned as a prize January 5, has been rejected.

Rajahoff Off Borneo. LABUAN, British Borneo, April 17.—The United States torpedo boat destroyers Barry and Chauncey arrived here this morning from the Philippines to join the United States fleet at Rajahoff, which, however, had already left. The destroyers did not sight any Russian or Japanese vessels.

French Admiral Joins Ship. SAIGON, April 17.—Admiral De Jonquiere has rejoined the French cruiser Decourtes in Kamranh bay, Cochinchina, about 30 miles northeast of Saigon.

Russian Sailor Rejoins Ship. SAIGON, April 17.—The Russian sailor who fell overboard and was rescued from a plank was brought to Saigon, whence he has joined the squadron.

Folk to Enforce Sunday Law. ST. LOUIS, April 17.—A telegram was received today from Governor Folk by Sheriff Herpel of St. Louis, which ran on the subject of enforcing the Sunday closing law, which was observed in St. Louis yesterday.

It is proposed to be ready to let contracts by that time so that building may actually be begun by September 1.

Cutting Off Parker's Power.

Proceedings were started today curtailing the power of Truant Officer Parker, which he has exercised up to the present time, when he checked out an amendment to the rules was introduced and acted upon favorably, which will cause the truant officer to be under the jurisdiction of the superintendent of education and not authorized to undertake prosecutions under his police authority without instructions from the latter.

Enlarging Clifton Hill School.

The authority was given for the construction of two frame additions, each 25x33 feet in size, on either end of the Clifton Hill school, the estimated cost being \$4,700, the work to be done under the supervision of the superintendent of buildings and the direction of the committee on buildings and property.
