

OMAHA TAKES ANOTHER ONE

Hard and Consistent Bating Piles Up Eight Runs for Bourke's Men.

MILLIONAIRES AT PFEISTER'S MERCY

Bourne's Men Score Only Run in First Inning and After that Only One Man Gets as Far as Third.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., April 28.—(Special Telegram.)—Omaha defeated Colorado Springs again today in the second game of the season by a score of 8 to 1. It looked for a time as if the locals would get even for Thursday's training, but Welch weakened in the sixth and the result was never in doubt from then on.

The story is told in brief by the inability of the Millionaires to connect with Pfeister's slants and their numerous bobbles in fielding. Colorado Springs scored an earned run in the first inning, but after that not a man got past second with the single exception of Pennell, who rapped out a pretty three-bagger in the third inning. Pennell, the first man up in the second half of the first inning, got a pass, but was thrown out at second immediately afterward on Blake's easy grounder to Schipke. McKean's long fly to center fell in a well, but Delehanty followed with a single, scoring Blake, who had stolen second. Knabe then struck out. Omaha started the fireworks in the sixth. Thiel walked. Carter got first on an error by the Colorado Springs pitcher, Welch sacrificed and Dolan drove both runners in on a two-bagger to right field, scoring the third run himself a minute later on Thomas's single. Martin flew out to center and Schipke fouled out, retiring the side.

Omaha scored five unearned runs in the eighth. Dolan walked, Thomas sacrificed him to second, Martin singled and Schipke followed with another, scoring Dolan and advancing Martin to third. The Omaha third baseman then stole second and took third on a passed ball, on which Martin crossed the plate. Gombing followed with the third consecutive hit, scoring Schipke. Pfeister laid on down right at the plate, but Mitze tried to catch him at first, threw the ball over his shoulder, allowing Gombing to score, while Pfeister advanced to second. 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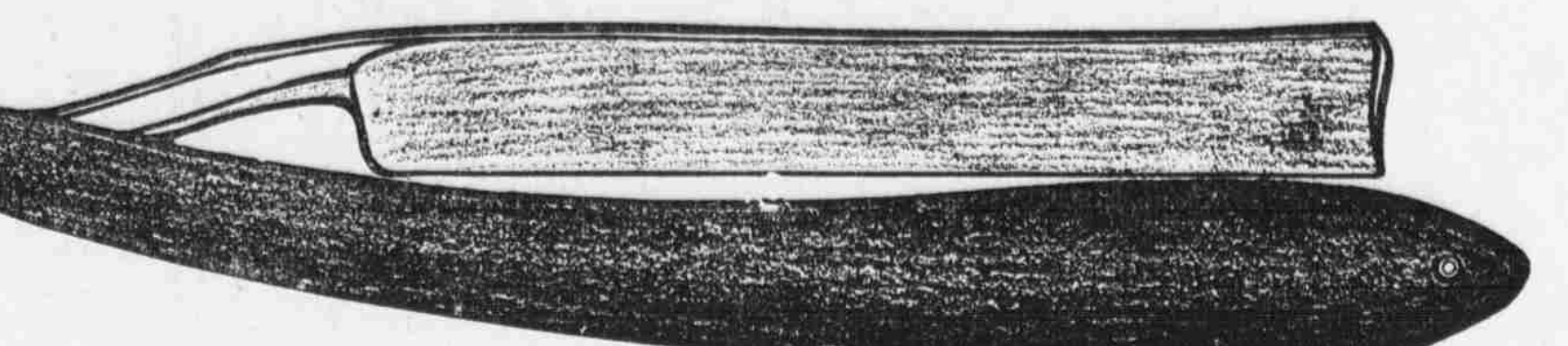

NO RACING AT WORTH TRACK Enforcement of State Law Against Gambling Stops the Races. CHICAGO, April 28.—Worth Jockey club today definitely abandoned the club's race meeting which was to begin tomorrow, opening the racing season in Chicago. The announcement was given out by Secretary J. E. Wagner after a meeting of officials here today. The stockholders of the Worth club decided that there was nothing else for them to do but bow gracefully as possible to the ultimatum of the state's attorney, who declared that the laws of Illinois concerning gambling must be observed.

Entries were still being taken at the Worth track when a telegram was off, immediately there was a morgue-like atmosphere over the race track enclosure. Owners who were on the ground silently went to their stables and gave orders for a hasty preparation to get out of Chicago. St. Louis, it is said, was besieged with requests for stable room, as was also Kansas City. A few contemplate going to Louisville, and some of the stables will ship their horses east.
