It is estimated that the American crop of spring wheat has an acreage of 20,99,060 acres, as against 14,700,000 last year, an increase of 6.5 per cent. Only one state snows a condition lower than '90. The Argentina shipments this week have been 3,212,000 busnels; last week they amounted to 4,040,000 busnels, and for this work of last year 3,222,000 busnels. A report comes from Duluth of the sale of 100,000 busnels of wheat to Minneapolls, considered by Chicago traders a concentration of interest in the contract grade wheat by the Pilisbury people. Chicago says that millers bought 65,000 busnels of wheat there Thursday, the market showing a lack of snap. This is credited by cash dealers to the advance in May above 90c. Some larger mills have a tendency to go slowly. BOSTON, May 5.—WOOL—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: The wool market is very strong here, with higher prices, while the west is feverishly excited. Considerable speculation in second wools has taken place and new territories have moved well at full values. Australian and South American crossbreds sold moderately and the disposition of owners is rather to buy than to sell. A very good business has been done in pulled wool. The London sales opened 52/15 per cent higher and all foreign markets are exceedingly strong. The shipments of wool from Boston to date from December 29, 1994, according to the same authority, are 88,436,574 pounds, against 63,435,138 pounds at the same time last year.
