
"Yank" Brown, Has Smallpox,

Cool, Moist Weather Interferes with Corn Planting in the Cen-

tral West.

WASHINGTON. May 2 .- The weekly crop bulletin issued by the weather bureau is summarized as follows:

summarized as follows: In California, generally throughout the central and southern Rocky mountain dis-tricus and in the Dakotas and Minnesota the week ending May 5 was abnormally coal, and moisture and freezing tempera-tures extended southward to the central portions of Arizona and New Mexico, with frost and snow in the central and northern Rocky mountain regions and upper Mis-souri and Red River of the North valleys. In the gulf states, central valleys, most of the lake region and in the Atlantic coas: districts, excepting New England, the tem-perature was favorable, but excensive rains indered work over the northern portions of the central and west gulf states, in the hower Ohio and central Mississippi valley in Minnesota and the Dakotas, and in the middle Rocky mountain region. Drouth conthues in New England and rain is needed in the middle Atlantic states, por-tions of Kanesa and on the North Pacific const.

tions of rains and on the termination of the second count. Heavy rains have prevented rapid prog-ress with corn over large portions of Mis-souri. Illinois and Indiana, but elsewhere this work has advanced satisfactorily, planting having begun as far north as the southern portions of South Dakota. Min-nessta and Michigan. In the southern states the general condition of the crop is reported as promising, but it is suffering for cultivation over a large part of the South Atlantic and east guif states and in Texas.

Texas. Winter wheat is now heading as far north as the southern portions of Kanzas and Missouri and in Kentucky. The general




