WILL WORK IN HARMONY

Big Live Stock Associations Will Co-operate in Matters of Mutual Interest.

NEW ORGANIZATION ADOPTS RESOLUTIONS

Attitude of President on Regulation of Railway Rates is Commended-Laws Asked to Correct

Abuses.

DENVER, May 11.-By resolutions adopted today the American Stock Growers' association pledged itself "to work in harmony with all live stock associations, whether local, state or national." J. F. Hagenbarth, president of the National Live Stock association, sought to have the committee on resolutions report a resolution pledging the American association "to hearty co-operation in the work projected by the national association."

This was opposed by the Texas members of the committee and a compromise was finally reached by striking out the name of the National Live Stock association and pledging the American association to work in harmony with all live stock associations, local, state or national, "to

bring about reforms so essential to the prosperity of the agricultural and live stock interests."

Resolutions were adopted also thanking President Roosevelt "for his fight for equal rights to all at the hands of the railroads." declaring that the present railroad law is inadequate "and should be strengthened by giving to the Interstate Commerce commis sion power to substitute just, fair and reasonable rates for those which it may find


