STOCK CALVES. STOCKERS AND FEEDERS

HOGS—The run was about normal here today, 108 loads being offered. With favorable reports from other market points, sellers had the advantage and there was a good tone to the trade. Buyers were out early and the demand was fully equal to the supply. Good light butcher weights were in best demand and those kinds were picked up in good season.
