Omaha's Solitary Run Due to Bill's Long Hit in the Second.

ST. JOE DRAWS A LONG ROW OF BLANKS

First Whiteash of Season on Home Grounds Administered by Pfeister, Who Pitched in Rare Form and Was Well Backed.

In a game characterized by sharp fielding and exceptionally good battery work the Champions defeated St. Joseph Thursday at Vinton Street park by the score of 1 to 0. Jack Pfeister was in the box for Omaha and he was at his best, which is pretty good, and permitted but three little singles, two of them Texas leaguers just over Martin's head and the third to Welch. He had perfect control of the ball and same at all stages and struck out seven of the old-timers from Missouri. He allowed but two to walk to first. Sharp fielding marked Omaha's play all of the way through and, barring the muff of a high one by Thiel, not an error or wobble was made. For the Saints' Andrews' wild throw to first to catch Carter was the only miscue. The outcome was the first whiteash of the season on the home grounds.

St. Vrain started to oblige for St. Joseph and the first and only thing that he did in the game was to permit Thiel to walk. He took such loud exceptions to the umpire's decision on these balls that Mr. Burns had to consign him to the rear and Jones was trotted over. Carter drew a pass from Jones and Welch attempted to bunt, but the ball popped right into the pitcher's hand on the fly. Dolan struck out and Thomas flew out to Fleming.

Double Plays Were Beanties.
Both of the double plays made by the Champions were of the kind to talk about around the old fire-side in the winter. After Fleming had been retired for trying to bunt the ball at the pitcher, Lazotte drew a pass and Douglas hit the ball down to Martin. The latter tried to catch Lazotte between bases, but the cunning Frenchman dodged him so that Martin was compelled to throw to first to catch Douglas. Thomas hustled the ball back to Dolan in time to catch Lazotte's fly. The other double was in the next inning when it looked very much to the sandpaper for Omaha. Andrews singled and went to second when Quinn put the ball in the same place the captain had, right over Martin's head. Best went out from Dolan to Thomas. Andrews got to third on the fly. Zimring picked a good one from the choice assortment that Pfeister was handing out and drove it right at Thiel,

who caught it on the run and boosted it in home in time to catch the Saints' captain at the plate and to shut off the run.
