Loss of Confidence in Values Causes a Rush to Liquidate.

SPECULATIVE POOLS PROCEED TO UNLOAD

Drop in Prices Impairs Margins and Brings Out Stop Loss Orders that Sends Values Still Lower.

NEW YORK, May 18.—Loss of confidence in values showed a notable growth during the progress of today's trading in stocks and a movement of great animation to liquidate was the consequence. Professional traders were very persistent and diligent on the short side of the market. There was heavy seiling by speculative pools, which have made unavailing efforts to get prices up, and the decline in prices brought other seiling by the impairment of margins and the uncevering of stop-loss orders. The downward course was not established without a struggle and a contest by friends of higher prices and the level vibrated many times during the course of the morning under the conflicting influence of operations on opposite sides of the market. Operations for the advance centered again on the transcontinental group and St. Paul Union Pacific and Southern Pacific at different times showed considerable strength. But the overaccumulation of these stocks in the effort to support the market made them weaker than the average when the unloading process began. It cannot be said that any important news developed during the day, but there was a very earnest discussion of a number of points in the outlook which have been brought into attention in the last few days.

The principal texts of the discussion by the professional operators were the announced policy of the administration to purchase the Panama coal supplies in foreign markets where that could be done more cheaply and the admitted lull in the Iron and steel trade. The opening up of the whole subject of tariff revision and the danger of unsettlement of the whole industrial and financial fabric were pointed to with assurance in the expressed opinions of the Dornate to the projects for community of interests in the northwest by exchange of holdings in different rallroads.
