(From a Staff Corespondent.) RED OAK, Ia., May 26.-(Special Tele gram.)-The prosecution in the Dennison case today made rapid progress on its long list of witnesses, and by those examined it attempted to show the responsibility of the financial statement sent by Dennison to Dennison's residence in Omaha. By one of the witnesses of the prosecution the defense proved that Dennison, since the Pollock robbery, had run his policy wheel in Iowa openly, and Attorney Connell announced that the court would later have to pass on the question whether Dennison had not been a resident of lowa for three years since the Pollock robbery, the supreme court of Iowa having held that a person may have residence in more than one state at the same time. Two of the witnesses for the prosecution, Frank Broadwell and Harry Deuel, testified to the good reputation of Dennison for truth and integrity, having been kept on the stand by the defense as its witnesses.

Laws for State of Minor Siege May Be Abandoned by Russia.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 25.-The Ignatieff commission for the revision of exceptional laws designed for safeguarding pub lic order has pronounced against a continu ance of the minor state of siege which is annually declared in many Russian cities. The commission finds that it led to the great abuses and arbitrariness and furnished a pretext for domiciliary visits and summary arrests. The commission recom mends the entire abolition of the so-called ninor state of siege and the substitution at times of great public stress of martial law, so as to leave the cities either in a normal condition, with the civil authority in full sway, or entirely under the control

of the military. The council of the empire has increased the appropriation for public education by \$625,000.

Private reports from Zhitmir, province of Volhynia, say the tension between the Jews and Christians is increasing and that both sides are arming.

JAPANESE COMMERCE IS GROWING

Ministers of Foreign Affairs and Finance Talk of Trade and War.

TOKIO, May 26.-Baron Komura, minister of foreign affairs; Baron Sone, minister of finance, and Baron Shibusawa ad-Shercliffe, and incidentally to establish dressed the Clearing House association today. Number of Transports Convoyed by Two Cruisers Refuse to Leave at Demand of Chinese Authorities,

BUILDING TRADES WILL NOT GO OUT

CHICAGO, May 26.-Rioting broke out afresh today in the teamsters' strike and although nobody was seriously hurt there were a number of vicious fights in the lumber district, during which the police were compelled to use their clubs, and in one instance revolvers in order to disperse

Policeman Shot in Hand.

This evening general rioting was prevalent throughout the lumber district and particularly in the territory near the intersection of Thirty-fifth street and Center avenue. The lumber wagons returning from making deliveries were attacked by crowds at every available opportunity. Large numbers of men armed with clubs, slungshots and bricks, accompanied by jeering women and excited children, filled the ridewalks along Center avenue, Thirty-fifth street, Loomis street and Archer avenue awaiting the passage of wagons which were believed by the crowd to be unguarded. At Archer avenue and Loomis street two trucks appeared with one policeman on each. They were immediately bombarded with bricks and stones and scores of air rifles were brought into play. A bullet from one of these weapons seriously wounded Policeman James Fitzpatrick in the right hand. The two policemen drew their revolvers and fired over the heads of the rioters, holding them at bay until the drivers managed to reach their destination at the yards of the Rittenhouse &
