In order to facilitate and lessen the work of the new municipal asphalt plant the attorney is considering the matter of drafting stricter ordinances regarding the cutting and opening of ments by public utility corporations and plumbers. He says the present laws are defective as they do not secure prompt results and often the city pays for the expenses of restoring the pavement. It is proposed to make every person or firm that disturbs the pavements make a cash deposit when a permit is obtained, the amount to be large enough to cover the cost of repairs. If the cuts are not repaired within two weeks or thirty days after they are caused, the city will be authorized to do the work and subtract the cost from the cash deposits. The chief complaint in Omaha is not that public utility coroporation do not repair pavements they have damaged.


