Garrels of Michigan, besides doing yoeman duty on the track threw the discus 140 feet 2% inches, beating the previous world's record of 138 feet 614 inches held by Sheridan of the New York Athletic club. Captain Friend of Chicago on his first attempt shattered the running broad jump record. When the tape showed that he had made a leap of 23 feet % inch an attendant began digging up more turf to give the captain room according to his strength. Friend was a foot ahead of his runner-up, French of Michigan.

The day was somewhat warm, even for the spectators, but 5,000 of them, the largest number ever gathered here to see a track meet, braved the heat and applauded the contestants. Among the spectators was President Harper of the University of Chicago. He saw his school triumph with apparent satisfaction, and showed no signs of Ill-health. A rather stiff breeze from the southwest adds to the triumph of the fast time that was made on the track, as the wind was almost squarely in the faces of the sprinters.
