TOKIO, June 12-6 p. m.-Official anouncement is made at the headquarters of Stewart or Lawrence, the imperial army that a detachment of Japanese cavairy succeeded in dislodging Russian cavalry in the vicinities of Hslyingtsu, six miles south of Liao Yang Wo-Hsiyingtsu, was occupied.
