

CHAMPIONS SOUSE GRIZZLIES

Omaha Whiteashes Denver in the Neatest Fashion of the Game.

QUICK PITCHES WELL WITH GOOD SUPPORT

Visitors Outplayed at Every Point and Never Have a Chance to Score During the Nine Innings.

The Houke family played like real champions yesterday, and the Grizzlies didn't have the least chance to score. The best opportunity that was offered them was in the eighth inning, when McHale opened with a neat two-base drive. He was caught just a minute later by a throw from quick to Lawler that was one of the features of the game. Once before this Denver had two men on bases and but one out, when Schaub allowed himself to be doubled with Per Hartzell on the latter's fly to left.

It was a good game from end to end, and was Omaha's all the way, for quick was in the form, barring a little wildness, and refused to allow the visitors to hit safe offense than once in an inning. Buck Thiel was out of the playing list, and Eddie Lawler, the popular local amateur, played the game of his life at short. All the Champions were in the fray from the first to the end, and several thousand people who didn't go out will never know just what a swell game they missed. The Grizzlies fought hard but were clearly outplayed. Schaub, who pitched for the first time, was touched up with some vim, and was a trifle wobbly in his fielding, as well. He delivered a speech from the bench while Denver was at the bat during the eighth inning, and Empire Scheuster excused him from further attendance during the afternoon. He had won his rest, however, and slipped out of the grounds very quietly.

Omaha Wins It Early.

Omaha scored tally in the first inning after Denver had been put down one-two, three, and it looked at the time as if more would follow, but Carter was the only Champ that crossed the plate. Lawler struck out, and Carter singled over Hoelketter's head and then proceeded to steal second and third. Dolan flew out to Belden and Carter scored on a passed ball. Welch and Martin both walked but Schipke knocked an easy one to Hoelketter and the chance was gone.

In the fifth the Omaha lads pulled off a series of brilliant plays. Lucia had driven a high one to Carter which the latter caught after a hard tussle with the wind and Schaub walked. McHale singled, and Hartzell drove a hot one to left field. It looked like the goods and Schaub and Old Sport were preparing to score when Heinke upset their calculation by catching the ball and making a swift whirl with it to Lawler, who was in the short-stop position. Lawler did not have time to swing, and the Omaha lads were left hand toss and completed the double, catching Schaub off second. Another double was made by Martin in the last inning, when with a man on first Enge knocked a grounder to Martin who ran out and touched Lucia and got the hit to first in time to complete the double.

Denver All to the Bad.

Omaha denied the game in the fifth inning when by four hits assisted by three errors by the Mountaineers five runs were scored. Heinke was the first man up and he was given a life by McGilvray juggling with the ball long enough to allow him to reach first. Gonding bunted and Schaub fell on the ball and then threw wild to second to catch Heinke and both were safe. Quick bunted and the Omaha players stood around the ball until the bases were filled. Lawler put the fixings to the game with a hard drive to left which Randall completely misjudged until two out and scored and Lawler on second. Carter was an easy out from Nic Perrine to first and Dolan flew out to Belden, the same sort of a drive he made in the first inning. Welch thought that it was about time for him to make a hit so he proceeded to get the ball and batted hard down the first base line for a double scoring Lawler. Martin's single sent Welch to third and Randall juggled the ball long enough for him to come on home. In the sixth inning Heinke hit for what should have been two bases to left field but Randall took so long to field the ball that Pa's new outfielder stretched it into a home run.

ARGO LOSES FINAL SERIES OF TRIAL RACES

Double Reef Breeze in Morning and Whole Sail Wind in Afternoon

Afford Two Very Satisfactory Sessions at Manawa.

The Priscilla has been selected to sail against the St. Joe boat, Toga, next Thursday, Friday and Saturday in defense of the Manawa challenge cup. This decision was made Sunday night after the last three trials, in one of which the Argo defeated the Priscilla for the only time. On Saturday the race was sailed over the south course in a light breeze which kept shifting from all directions. The starting gun was fired at 4 o'clock, and the Argo crossed the line seven seconds ahead of the Priscilla and took the windward berth. While beating to the first buoy the boats were close together, but the Argo held the Priscilla under its lee and rounded well ahead. Until they tacked for the third mark neither boat seemed to windward work and turned hard astern the Argo. In keeping too near the shore, however, it ran under its lee and was practically becalmed, while the Argo held out in the lake and ran to the flags with a fair breeze. When the Argo started around the course for the second time it was more than six minutes ahead, but failed to increase its lead before finishing. Elapsed time: Argo, 1 hour 17 minutes, and 42 seconds; Priscilla, 1 hour 34 minutes and 15 seconds.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 18.—At the conclusion of the St. Louis-New York National league baseball game today a crowd of spectators of the game set upon Manager John McGraw and he was severely beaten and had the police interposed if it was not for the fact that McGraw had suffered a severe attack of apoplexy and was not in the mood to be interfered with. While the New York side was entering an omnibus by the side of which McGraw was sitting, a crowd assembled and began jeering McGraw. The crowd was later released and set upon him, somebody struck McGraw on the shoulder with an umbrella and this was followed by a shower of stones. McGraw was accompanied from the ball grounds by several policemen and there was no further trouble.

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Sunday the conditions were more favorable, as a stiff southeast wind arose and covered the lake with white caps. In the morning race both boats carried double reefs as they crossed the line on the gun, Priscilla to the windward and slightly ahead. There were two windward legs and a reach before the run for the flag, and although the Priscilla kept the lead it could not shake the Argo from its stern until after leaving the third buoy. In fact, on the beat from the second to the third mark it was a question each time which boat would lead, as they crossed from spitting tacks. If the Argo had not run around for a moment it would have turned the buoy better and kept its place, which it was unable to do. On the second run from the south buoy the boats shook out their reefs and finished at a thrilling pace, the Priscilla leading by 1 minute and 25 seconds. Elapsed time: Argo, 1 hour 17 minutes and 42 seconds; Priscilla, 1 hour 2 minutes and 35 seconds.

The wind had abated somewhat by afternoon and the boats carried full sail. Again the south course was sailed, but as the wind had veered to the west there was only one or two minutes' work. On the first leg the Argo fell behind, and at no time during the race did it seem to hold its own. The hardest of its luck, however, was in breaking the spreaders of its mast after turning the fifth mark, which compelled it to leave the race, as the Argo was in danger of being carried away every moment. The Priscilla finished the course in forty-five minutes and twenty-six seconds, which is the fastest time of the year.

The St. Joe boat with its crew will arrive in Council Bluffs Tuesday morning, and the time then will be set for the first race Thursday.
