Board of Review Now Has Some Work to to Occupy Its Time.

STOCK YARDS ASSESSMENT UNDER FIRE

Complaint Lodged to Effect that Tax Commissioner O'Neill's Figures Are But Half Those of Assessor Reed.

Quite a little stir was raised at the sesion of the Board of Review Wednesday when E. L. Howe, city treasurer, and Colonel C. M. Hunt filed a protest against the assessment made on the property of the Union Stock Yards company. The protest reads that the signers in behalf of themselves and other property owners object to the assessment returned by Tax Commissioner O'Neil on the property of the stock yards company, and especially on the valuation of the real estate of the company. Here is a portion of the renonstrance:

Your complainants show that said prop-Your complainants show that said property was assessed by the tax commissioner of this city for the year 1905 at the sum of \$2,139,425, which sum is grossly inadequate and is less than one-half of the fair value of the real estate of said company, and is less than one-half of the amount for which the same property is assessed and taxed by the authorities of Douglas county, and is less than one-half of the valuation which should be placed upon said property, and upon which it of the valuation which should be placed upon said property, and upon which it should be taxed by the authorities of this city. Your complainants therefore pray that you give to said company proper notice and set a time for hearing to increase the assessment of said company for the year 1965, and that you increase the assessment of said company from the amount returned by the city tax commissioner, \$2,133,425, to an amount in excess of \$4,327,-256.

When this remonstrance was filed the members of the board talked the matter over and set Friday morning for the time of the hearing. Jerry Fitzgerald, clerk of the board, was sent with a notice to W. J. C. Kenyon, general manager of the stock yards company. 
