

STANDS BY THE OLD ORDER

Official Interpretation is Given to Words of Tsar to Zemstvo's Delegation.

NO PROMISE OF CONSTITUTIONAL RULE

Newspapers are Ordered Not to Print Deductions from Address Not Authorized by Language of the Emperor.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 23.—The official interpretation of the emperor's speech to the delegation of zemstvos and mayors at Peterhof June 19 is given in the following circular sent by the ministry of the interior to all the newspapers:

The emperor during the reception of the members of the zemstvos and municipalities have been incorrectly interpreted by a portion of the periodical press and several newspapers have gone so far as to deduce therefrom the existence of a conspiracy against the emperor and to imply an extension of the imperial rescript of March 11, 1905, to the effect that the emperor in the sense of a convocation of representatives of the people on the basis of the existing constitution of any kind countries of western Europe, whereas it was clearly shown by the emperor's words that the conditions of such a convocation were to be based on an order of things responding to Russian conditions, and absolutely not the least indication of the possibility of modifying the existing constitution.

The Slavo, M. Witte's organ, traces the origin of the war to the late Interior Minister von Plehve and concludes that the black page which preceded the bloody pages of the book of our far eastern affairs has at last been torn out by the emperor and all Russia will rejoice.

The vice royalty of the far east having been abolished by the imperial ukase of June 21, Admiral Alexieff has been appointed commander in chief of the Council of the Empire and will continue to hold his position as aide-de-camp general to the emperor.

Alexis Retired Under Threat.

A story is current in the city that the day before Grand Duke Alexis resigned the post of his admiral he received a formal warning from the terrorists informing him that unless he retired within twenty-four hours sentence on him would be passed and executed.

The announcement of Admiral Alexieff's retirement was not accompanied by the usual receipt of praise and it bears all the earmarks of imperial disfavor. The retirement of Grand Duke Alexis as high admiral and of Alexieff as viceroy of the far east is the resignation of the far eastern committee in quick succession, was the best evidence that Japan could need that the emperor has washed his hands of the whole Manchurian adventure.

The minister of the interior has prohibited the publication of the Russ for a month.

The Russ was suspended upon the recommendation of Assistant Minister of Interior Treppoff. The Russ, which has enjoyed an immense circulation lately, has been the government's most severe critic, waging unceasing war against the emperor and the tsar since the exposure after the murder of Grand Duke Sergius, February 17, 1905, Alexis did not leave his palace, as he had again been notified that the terrorists had placed a bomb on the list of those who were to be executed.

Many Killed in Poland.

LODZ, Russian Poland, June 23.—A bloody collision between soldiers and a crowd of people occurred here today. Many people were killed.

Disturbances are anticipated here in connection with the recent shooting of workmen at Lodz.

NORWEGIAN CASE BEING DELAYED

No Developments Expected Until Debate Comes Up Next Week.

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, June 23.—There is no foundation for the rumors circulating at Copenhagen and elsewhere of the probability of King Oscar abdicating in favor of the crown prince in consequence of the dissatisfaction of some of his actions with the government's pacific attitude in the crisis.

No developments of importance are expected here before June 27, when the debate will take place in the Riksdag and the special joint committee of the chambers will be appointed to report on the government's proposal for a settlement of the questions growing out of the disruption of the union.
