MOST RAILROADS CARRY SPECIAL TRAINS

Heavy Rain in Western Nebraska Greatly Delays Train Service on All of the Roads Running Westward.

A special carrying 30 delegates from Minnesota passed through Omaha over the Burlington for the convention at Denver Monday night at 11:35 and the special with the delegates from South Dakota and northwestern Iowa left Omaha at the same hour.

The special carrying the Rock River conference from Illinois will go west over the Burlington Tuesday at 11 p. m., and the special with the Galesburg district will go west over the Burlington early Tuesday morning.

Rains Delay Trains

General heavy rain and practically a tempest in the western portion of the state delayed all of the trains to a considerable extent Saturday, Sunday and Monday, the Burlington being chief sufferer.

While this track was blocked the Burlington diverted twelve trains to the Union Pacific between Sterling and Grand Island.

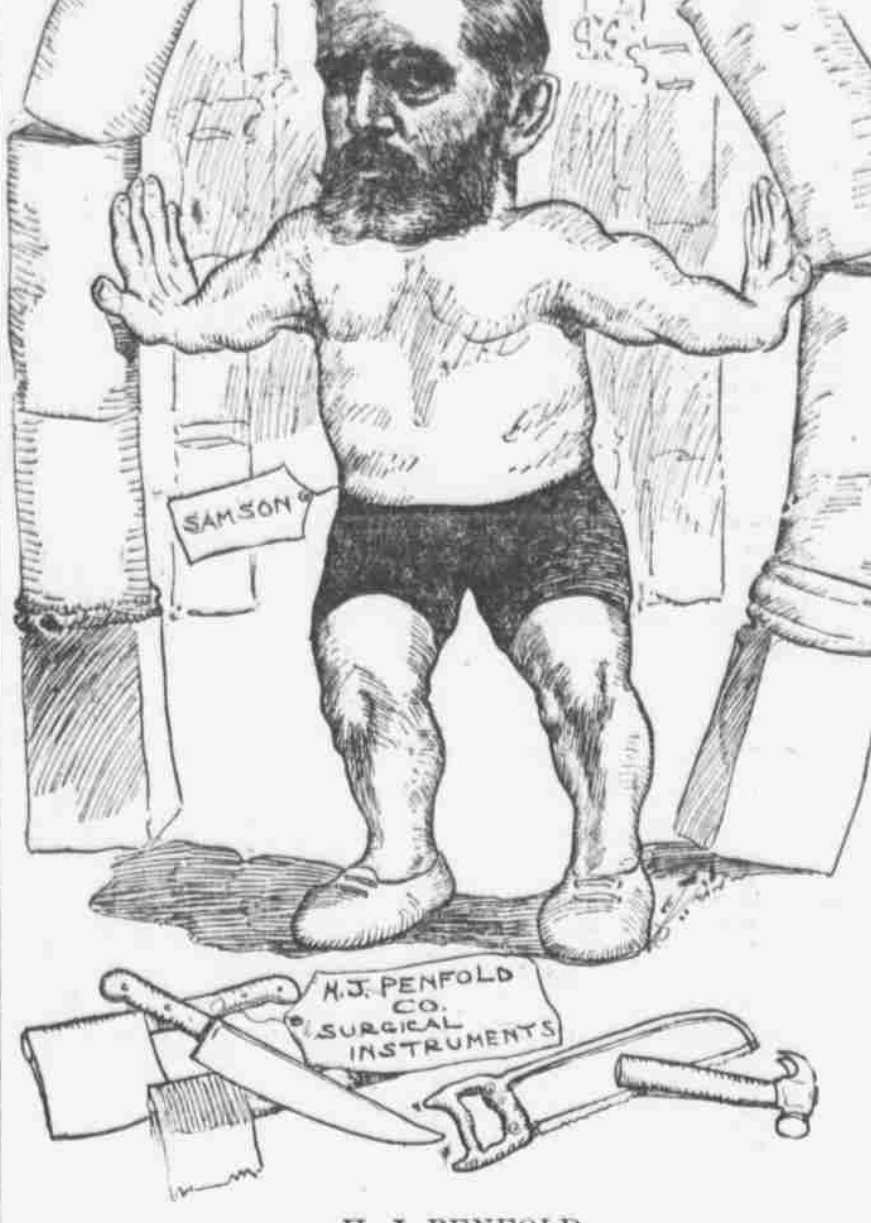
