**ROUTINE OF KIRKMAN CASE**

General Orders Pertaining to Court-Martial Just Promulgated to Army.

**SHOW DIFFERENT STAGES OF AFFAIR**

Former Captain in Federal Army is Convicted on Two Courts-Martial and Acquitted on One.

The general orders pertaining to the general courts-martial of Captain George W. Kirkman, Twenty-fifth United States Infantry, have been recently promulgated to the army. It appears that Captain Kirkman was given three general courts-martial, being convicted on two of them and acquitted on one. His conviction brought with it the sentence of three years in the United States penitentiary at Fort Leavenworth and his dismissal from the army. Captain Kirkman was first tried at Fort Niobrara under special orders No. 8, January 4, 1898, No. 14, January 14, 1898, and

No. 11, January 17, 1898, Department of the Missouri, and of which Colonel Jacob A. Angus, Tenth cavalry, was president, and First Lieutenant Beverly A. Read, Sixth cavalry, was judge advocate. The charges against the accused officer were: Charge 1, conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman, in violation of the sixty-first article of war, embodying thirty-one specifications; charge 2, conduct to the prejudice of good order and military discipline, in violation of the sixty-second article of war, seven specifications. Being arraigned under these charges and specifications Captain Kirkman pleaded not guilty to both charges and specifications. He was, however, found guilty by the court of all the specifications in the first charge except the second, seventeenth and thirtieth, and of all of the specifications in the second charge, also of both charges.

President Approves Sentence.

His sentence under this conviction was "to be dismissed from the service of the United States and to be confined at hard labor for a period of two years at such penitentiary as the reviewing officer should direct." The sentence was approved by President Roosevelt and the Fort Leavenworth penitentiary was designated as the place for his confinement.

The accused officer was again tried for a

third time before a general court-martial at Fort Niobrara, pursuant to special orders No. 6, March 13, 1898, Department of the Missouri, and of which Colonel Edward B. Pratt, Thirtieth infantry, was president and Lieutenant B. A. Read, 186c, was judge advocate. The charges, two in number, were identical with those in his first trial, there being two specifications in each charge, all of which he was found guilty. The sentence in this instance was dismissal from the service of the United States, and confinement in the Fort Leavenworth penitentiary for one year at hard labor. The proceedings in this case were also approved by President Roosevelt. The concluding paragraph of the order, general orders No. 36, War department, dated June 17, 1898, states: "Captain Kirkman ceases to be an officer of the army from June 17, 1898." By order of the secretary of war, Anna B. Chaffee, lieutenant general, chief of staff.

**Second Trial at Niobrara.**

The second trial of Captain Kirkman was held at Fort Niobrara, by the same court, of which Colonel J. A. Read was president and Lieutenant B. A. Read judge advocate. The charges were identical with the two trials resulting in his conviction, but the specifications were different, these embodying the fraudulent conversion of

some \$45, more or less, of company funds to his own use, in the alleged purchase of a photograph for the company, Company I, Twenty-fifth infantry, in May, 1894. Of these charges and specifications the court found the accused officer not guilty, and therefore acquitted him. The acquittal was disapproved by Brigadier General T. J. Wint, commanding the Department of the Missouri, in these words:

In the foregoing case of Captain George W. Kirkman, Thirtieth infantry, an examination of the evidence seems to establish beyond a reasonable doubt the charge of forgery, and beyond all doubt, and practically upon admissions of the accused the charge of falsifying his accounts and that of entering and subscribing to a false finding as a member of the company council in auditing said accounts. It is not understood upon what interpretation of the evidence or justification in law the court based their conclusion on the charges mentioned.

**TWO BIG BUILDING PERMITS**

Licenses for Merriman & Holmquist's Elevator and Schmolzer & Mueller's Piano House Issued.

The July building record received two large orders Saturday morning, when permits for the new Merriman & Holmquist grain elevator at Fifteenth and Manderson streets, and for the new five-story and basement brick block which Schmolzer & Mueller are to occupy with their piano house at 1311-12 Faraway street, were taken out. Each is estimated to cost \$40,000.

The grain elevator will be an iron-covered frame structure 42 feet wide, 56 feet long and 131 feet above the tracks. Seelye, Sen & Co., of Fremont are the architects and builders. The piano house is to be built by the J. N. Brown estate and the old brick buildings standing on the site are to be destroyed. Plans were drawn by Fleisk & Lewis and Griffin & Chapin are

the contractors. The ground dimensions will be 42x32 feet and the block will be designed especially to meet the demands of the piano house, an auditorium and recital room to be provided. Work on both buildings is to be started at once.

Other permits issued were to Sam Rogers for an 800 brick blacksmith shop at 1411 Davenport; E. C. Best, \$1,500 frame dwelling at Twenty-fifth and Saratoga; E. R. Smith, \$1,500 frame dwelling at Twenty-third and Boulevard.

**MUCH WOE FOR ONE COUPLE**

Troubles of Max Hershman and Wife Appear to Have No End.

The troubles of Max Hershman and wife of Sheely street seem to be without end. They were arrested Friday evening by Officer Inna and Special Agent Visard of the Union Pacific on the charge of receiving stolen property. Detective Elfsfelder of South Omaha took the couple to South Omaha Saturday, to answer the charge of breaking and entering the Northwestern switch-shanty at Fifty-fourth and J streets, South Omaha, several days ago, when it is said, 60 pounds of brass was taken. Some of the brass has been found

in the possession of the Hershmans, officers state.

When the South Omaha officer read the warrant to the Mr. and Mrs. Hershman at the Omaha city jail Saturday morning the chief magistrate that seemed to bother Hershman was whether the officer would pay street car fare to South Omaha for himself and wife. Being assured that the car fare would be paid, Hershman heaved a sigh of relief and said he was ready to start for the Magic city.

A charge of throwing dead rats on the public streets is now pending against Mrs. Hershman. The case will be heard in the local police court next Thursday morning. William Snook, a neighbor of the Hershmans at Sheely station, alleges the woman threw twenty dead rodents on the street in front of his residence, the attendant odor smelling to heaven and part way to the gas factory.

**Funeral of Jones.**

The funeral of Charles Jones, the young man shot Tuesday afternoon at Military park, was held Saturday afternoon at the family residence, 367 Parker street. Rev. Charles W. Savidge, pastor of the People's church, conducted the service. Burial was at Forest Lawn.
