MUST ANSWER TO FEDERAL GRAND JURY

Man Told Chaplain Silver Latter Was Fortunate Murder Was Not Committed in His House that Night.

The adjourned hearing of Harry L. Roth the Fort Crook tailor charged with attempted burglary at the residence of Chap lain H. Percy Silver on the night of July at Fort Crook, was had before United States Commissioner Anderson Wednesday morning. The only witnesses examined were Chaptain Silver and Corporal Edward son of Fort Crock for the governmen and the defendant.

Judge Anderson was of the opinion that there was sufficient cause to hold the accused for burgiary and he placed him under bonds in \$500 for his appearance before the federal grand Jury.

The basis for binding over Roth was in the fact that he had opened a screen window to secure the key with which to open the rear or kitchen door and his admission to Chaplain Silver while in the house that he (the chaplain) could consider himself "fortunate that a murder had not been committed in the house that night." The implied threat was not directed to Chaplain Silver, but referred to some supposed party whom Roth thought might be visiting his girl, a domestic employed at

The government held that the surreptitious entering of the house with the avowed intention of committing a felony was sufficient ground to constitute the act of burglary, even though no overt crime was committed.

Judge Anderson took this view of the case and hence bound over the accused to the federal grand jury.
