PREPARING TO MAKE AWARDS Rules and Regulations for Awards at Portland Are Approved by

Commission. PORTLAND, Ore., July 20.-Rules and egulations for the appointment of an international jury of awards for the making of awards on exhibits at the Lewis and Clark exposition were approved today by the Oregon Exposition commission, making them operative. Four classes of awards are provided for, viz: Gold medals, silver medals, bronze medals and certificates of honorable mention. In addition the code provides for a diploma of highest award which will be assigned to exhibit articles of vastly superior nature. Examining jurors will be selected from among government officials, state commissioners and foreign representatives, and no one on this jury will be allowed to compete. There are 3,000 exhibitors at the fair and a majority of these have already applied for competition slips, enabling them to compete for awards. The jury's work as provided by the code will commence August 15.
