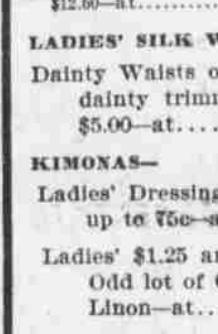

BIG GRAIN MEN DRAW OUT

Nye-Schneider, Uplik and Ferguson Quit the State Association.

PERSISTENT RUMOR OF DISSOLUTION

Secretary Miller Refuses to Talk and Attorney Learned Says the Organization is Not Going to Pieces.

Information regarding the affairs of the Nebraska Grain Dealers' association came to light Friday which lends credence to the current report that the alleged "grain trust" of the state is on the verge of dissolution.

Three of the wealthiest firms in the association have withdrawn their membership and it is said that numerous single elevator concerns in various parts of the state already have withdrawn or are preparing to follow the lead of the big dealers. At the same time it is stated that the association is considering the advisability of calling a meeting for the purpose of dissolving the organization.

The three big firms which have withdrawn are the Nye-Schneider-Powder company of Fremont, the Uplik Grain company of Omaha and W. H. Ferguson of Lincoln. Attorney Courtwright of Fre-

mont, representing the Nye-Schneider-Powder company, admitted to The Bee Friday over long-distance telephone that the company was no longer a member of the association. When the withdrawal was made he declined to say. Regarding the proposed dissolution of the association he said he knew nothing.

Uplik Refuses to Talk.

Reports from various responsible sources say that the Uplik Grain company withdrew a few days ago. Nelson B. Uplik was asked about the matter and he refused to confirm or deny the reports.

W. H. Ferguson withdrew from membership in the association April 1, according to his recent testimony on the witness stand at Lincoln. He was made a defendant in the suit of Tom Worrall against the alleged trust on the supposition that he was a member of it. He declared on the stand that he had withdrawn from the association April 1 having decided that the organization had outlived its usefulness toward the purpose for which it was formed.

These three companies represent 172 of the 770 elevators owned by the members of the association. W. H. Ferguson owns seventy, Nye-Schneider-Powder seventy and the Uplik Grain company thirty-two. The other concerns are not nearly so large.

It is now said that one of these companies, before it went out, made a proposition for the dissolution of the association, but that it was turned down. Another simply withdrew without saying anything about breaking up the organization. Now

FRY WINS GREAT AUTO RACE

Beats Some of World's Renowned Chauffeurs' Nervous-Racking Runs.

ALL SALOON CASES NOLLED

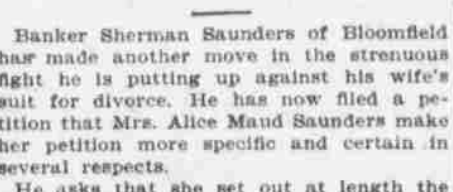
General Order Issued by Baxter on Basis of the Brewer Decision.

United States District Attorney Baxter has nulled all of the saloon conspiracy cases for which indictments were found against the Homer saloonists at the recent session of the federal grand jury. The dismissal of the cases are based on the decision of the United States supreme court, known as the Brewer decision, which accords to Indian allottees of public lands the rights of citizens to purchase firewater and imbibe it with the same liberty as other citizens off the Indian reservations.

SOUVENIR CARDS AS MAIL

All of Indecent Character Are Confiscated by the Postal Authorities at Omaha.

"There is nothing particularly new in the recent agitation regarding the non-mailability of suggestive souvenir postal cards of the extreme French order," said Post-office Inspector A. J. Moore. "We have confiscated a number of them and will continue to do so when they pass the limits of decency and come within the postal rule of obscene, lewd or lascivious matter and every article or thing intended, designed or adapted for any indecent or immoral purpose. It is pretty hard to draw the line on these things and we have to look after them very carefully. It is true that there has been a great many suggestive cards sent through the mails recently and they are stopped whenever found."

Superintendent of Mails Major Cramer said:

"We have not been bothered with many of these cards here as yet, but we invariably confiscate them and send them to Washington when they appear to come within the prohibited class. It is a delicate and difficult matter to confiscate mail and we have to be very careful to keep within the law, which, by the way, is plain enough to guard all writers or senders of prohibited mail matter. I had not heard that the picture of Satan was prohibited from the mails and I do not know that this picture could be classed with the prohibited matter."
