Testament of Millionaire Makes Widow Executrix, but Does Not Name Fortune.

PROVISIONS NOT OPERATIVE NOW Mrs. Nash Will Control and Administer Estate During Her Lifetime-All Realty in Her Name.

In the county court Saturday morning the last will and testament of the late Edward W. Nash was admitted to probate. Mrs. Catherine B. Nash, the widow, was appointed sole administratrix and executrix, without bond. She also was appointed guardian of the two minor daughters, Esther and Frances.

The will is peculiar in that its provisions are not now operative, as Mrs. Nash has survived her husband. She will control and administer the estate during her lifetime. All of the real estate has been in Mrs. Nash's name for several years. This consists of the Nash block on Harney street, the homestead on Burt street and some few pieces of other real estate.

The will was executed on December 1, 1904, in New York City, and it named as executors and trustees Louis C. Nash, L. T. Crofoot and George W. Myers, a son and two sons-in-law, respectively. The will was drawn by Messmore Kendall, an attorney of New York, and witnessed by John E. Wyman, New York; Belle A. Traynor of 36% Burt street, Omaha, and Darsa J.

Densmore of Brooklyn. The only bequest of a public nature named in the will is one of \$10,000 to the

St. James Orphanage. Upder the instrument as drawn an annuity of \$1,000 a year was to have been paid to testator's brother, Fred A. Nash. The two minor daughters, Frances and Esther, were to have had \$25,000 each. The balance of the property was to have been constituted a trust fund under the executors and trustees named. Under this general trust fund there were to have been several others for the benefit of the children and grandchildren. These various trusts were hedged about with legal provisions as to investment and the manner in which the executors should invest and handle the property. They are now, of course, ineffective.

Neither the application for administration nor the will itself contains any estimate of the value of the estate which Mrs. Nash will control. Attorney Crofoot, the son-in-law who is attending to the legal business for Mrs. Nash, said it is impossible to make an estimate.

I have no definite idea of the value of Mr. Nash's various interests and investments," said Mr. Crofoot. "It is not possible at this time to make an intelligent estimate. There are too many considerations avolved to make an off-hand statement of

Creamery Market. OLD MANUFACTURER BLAMES NEW ONE

Such is Alleged Cause of Trouble in the

Declares Trade and Price Agreement Will Not Be Broken, but Hard Fight Will Be Made on New Concern,

Omaha creamery men are not much alarmed over reports that long established price and trade agreements will be shattered within a short time and each of the seven plants of the kind in this city buy butter fat exactly as it pleases. They say rumors to this effect come from the owner of a creamery lately established in Omaha, who, although a member of the association, has been caught giving secret premiums to on their cream.

farmers who will give him the preference "The big problem of the butter-making business in Nebraska lies in getting sufficient quantities of the butter fat or the useful ingredient in cream, and the creamery companies don't like to see the sources they have developed by years of work and thousands of dollars demoralized," said a representative of one of the big companies. "We have always refused to look upon our price agreements as a trust or combination for several reasons. In the first place no farmer is disabled from churning his own cream, making his own butter and putting it on the market in competition with ours. So high have the prices for butter fat been kept, however, having just completed her tour of all the by the very assistance of the agreement that it is far more profitable for him to sell us his cream.

Prices Unusually High. "During the present summer an unprece dentedly high range of prices to the farme has been maintained. The very scarcity of butter fat in this territory makes the high prices obligatory and I feel warranted in saying that the creameries are now allowing just as much as they can and at the
