

CATTLEMEN MAKING GOOD

Special Attorney Rush Says They Are Tearing Down Illegal Fences.

SPIRIT OF DEFIANCE HAS OZZED OUT

Appearance of Deputy United States Marshals with Warrants to Seize Convicted Trespassers of Their Danger.

The office of the United States District Attorney is busily engaged preparing for the prosecution of the land fencing cases. Reports are being constantly received from the special field agents, DeFrees, Chambers and Dixon, who are now operating in the Valentine district in Cherry county, and in the North Platte district in Grant and Deuel counties.

"We have reliable information that the fences in McPherson county are coming down rapidly, a result of the information recently filed against the Reed and Miller ranches in that county," said Special Attorney Rush, Tuesday.

"The cattlemen are beginning to see that the government does not intend to trifle with them and consequently they are coming to time. We have been visited by a number of ranchmen from other districts, particularly along the forest reservations, who have awakened to the fact that the government means just what it says, and they have promised that their fences shall come down at once.

Are Tearing Down Fences.

"They are making good their promise, too, as we are learning from the special agents in the field. They were at first disposed to make a bluff at defiance, but when the deputy marshals appeared in the district with warrants for the arrest of Reed and the Miller brothers they began to see that it was not a matter for child's play and they are falling over each other, so to speak, in clearing away their fences from the public lands. We expect to hear the same good report from the Valentine district very soon. We have a large number of cases now about ready for trial. Some of them are equity cases that will be brought directly to trial, while those of a quasi-criminal character will be referred to the grand jury.

"There is another feature of the cases pertaining to certain lands that are temporarily withdrawn from entry that the government will see are not wholly appropriated by the big cattlemen to the exclusion of the small cattle owners. There are 2,000,000 or 3,000,000 of acres of these lands in Nebraska, and wherever there is found to be a fence on them the parties building or controlling it will be brought to trial.

"Another phase of the cases the government is also looking into is that of fraudulent entry or filing. It has been found that much of this kind of work has been done, and where found the entries will be canceled and the guilty parties prosecuted for perjury."

SOLDIERS GO TO THEIR CAMP

Three Companies of National Guards Go to Annual Encampment at Kearney.

Three companies of soldiers from Omaha left for the annual state encampment at Kearney Tuesday morning. They were: Company G of the Second Nebraska, known as the Omaha Guards; Company L of the First Nebraska, known as the Thurston Rifles and Company I of the First Nebraska, known as the Omaha Light Infantry. The officers in charge of the Thurston Rifles were Captain Baehr, First Lieutenant Brown and Second Lieutenant Burnmaster; of the Omaha Light Infantry, Captain Kroeger, First Lieutenant Wig and Second Lieutenant Eller; and of the Omaha Guards, Captain Paulsen, First Lieutenant Hervey and Second Lieutenant Furay. Major Osborn, assistant adjutant general, accompanied the battalion, which occupied five coaches on the Union Pacific. The remainder of the train was made up of baggage cars and cars for the companies which will be picked up at Columbus and Schuyler. Many photographers and wives and sweethearts of the departing soldiers were on hand to see them off when the train left at 9:30 Tuesday morning.

NEW MANUAL TRAINING ROOM

School Board Adopts Plans and Specifications for an Apartment 20 by 40.

Power, Fleming and Woodrough Come Out Into the Open.

SHOWS COMPLEXION OF THE TICKET

Other Candidates for Sheriff, but Present Incumbent Seems to Tower Above His Opponents in Strength.

Announcements for candidates for county office on the democratic side of the fence already give a sort of an outline of what the democratic county ticket may look like this fall. It is fairly well settled that Sheriff John Power will be renominated for a fourth term. A lot of other democratic statesmen think they are cut out to be sheriffs, among them Tom Flynn, John Liddell, Jailer Roach, the perennial Jim Connolly, to say nothing of lesser lights, but the chances are they will all have to take a back seat for the present sheriff as the only man who has a record of success to stand on.

For treasurer William Fleming, who has been drawing the salary of city tax commissioner for six years, will be in the running for the democracy. The idea of getting G. Fred Elasser to run again having been abandoned for various good and sufficient reasons, Fleming, who was elected to his present office as a silver republican, insists now that he is a true-blue democrat and the abolition of the office of city tax commissioner would otherwise leave him without a job.

Woodrough a New Man.

J. W. Woodrough is looked to take the democratic nomination for county judge without a contest. Woodrough is pretty new in Omaha as compared with some other democratic lawyers who have been brewing wood and carrying water for the party for many years, but as the partner of W. F. Gurley he promises to bring with him the support of Gurley and his class of republicans, who are half democrats, and want this job to hold them.

County Clerk Dressel is much in the same boat as Sheriff Power and expects a renomination without hustling too hard for it. The democratic ticket without him, his friends insist, would not look natural.

These four offices are all the democrats will really fight for, although they will probably put up candidates for the rest of the ticket for fear they might be accused of running short of material. For police judge it is said that S. I. Gordon is figuring on another democratic nomination to help him back into the job. Since the demo-
