#### Iowa Loses 15,000,

The census department has completed the census of seventy-five of the ninety-nine ounties of the state. The figures for these and the figures from the county auditors from the rest of the counties show that the loss in population of Iowa for the past five years will be about 15,000. The population as shown by these figures will be jury at the hearing today, charged with 2.216.068. In 1900 it was 2,221,853. Of the ninety-nine countles only twenty-three have made a gain in population. 
