DEADLOCK ON FREE RIDES

City Authorities and Motor Company Officials Unable to Agree.

MOTOR COMPANY INSISTS ON UNIFORMS

City Authorities Stick to Right of All Policemen to Ride Free and Will Arrest Conductors if Refused.

At a conference held yesterday morning between Superintendent Tucker of the motor company, Earl & Tinsley, the company's local attorney, and Mayor Macrae and Chief of Police Richmond over the question of the free transportation of members of the police force, Mayor Macrae declined to listen to any compromise.

On behalf of the motor company it was contended that it would be inadvisable to permit members of the police force to ride free merely on showing their stars. The motor conductors, it was contended, would on becoming acquainted with the officers neglect to require them to show their stars and the result would be that men would be permitted to ride free after they had left the police force.
