Twenty-Fourth Street Paving Moved Along Another Step Toward Starting.

CONTRACTORS FILE BOND WITH THE CITY

Council Proposes to Secure Money to Pay for Work and Matter Begins to Look More Encouraging.

A good start towards the Twenty-fourth street paving was made last night when the city council met in adjourned session.

An ordinance providing for the issuing of bonds in the sum of \$20,000 for the payment of the city's portion of the cost of the repaving was read for the first time and referred to the judiciary committee.

The plans for the fire department headquarters building were agreed upon and Clerk Gillin was instructed to advertise for bids for the construction of the building.

Outside School Rooms.

On account of the delay in completing the additions to school buildings in time for the opening of the schools it will be necessary for the Board of Education to rent temporarily seven outside rooms.

Last June the school census was taken and the enumerators' returns show 6,713 children of school age in the city.



BIG FIRE AT GAS PLANT

Building and Fuel Destroyed to Amount of Twenty Thousand Dollars.

SPONTANEOUS COMBUSTION THE CAUSE

Blaze Observed First in Pile of Slack Coal by Employees at Three O'Clock in the Morning.

Spontaneous combustion is believed to have been the cause of a costly fire Wednesday morning at the Omaha Gas company plant at Twentieth and Center streets.

The fire was noticed by employees of the plant about 3:30 a. m. in a pile of slack coal. With a large hose the men fought the fire until they thought they had it under control, only to find it breaking out in another place and with considerable fury.
