FIRE AND POLICE CUT DOWN

Forces Are Reduced by Board in Compliance with the Charter.

BOTH DEPARTMENTS ARE DISPLEASED

Two Chiefs Say This Action Will Tend Greatly to Impair the Service They Must Give the City.

Action was taken by the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners Thursday morning toward reducing the fire and police forces because of lack of funds to carry the present quotas to the end of the year. The comptroller's report stated that the fire fund was short of \$18,000 in the fire fund and \$10,000 in the police fund if the full forces are continued to December 31. According to the commissioners nothing remains under the string of provisions of the new charter, but to put about half the 119 men in the fire department and about one-fourth of the ninety-eight men in the police department on furlough, without pay, for the months of September, October, November and December. This resolution, drawn up by Commissioner Broatch, was adopted by the board.

Whereas, the funds provided for the maintenance of the fire and police departments at their present standard of the present fiscal year, to do so creating a deficit of about \$18,000 in the fire fund and \$10,000 in the police fund; and, whereas, the laws hold an official personally responsible for any expenditure in excess of the levy; therefore, Be Resolved, That the finance committee report to this board the feasibility of reducing the fire and police departments to a point where they will cost no more revenue than 90 per cent of the current taxes and as much more of the current taxes as may be paid in.

Annually for years shortages in the fire and police funds towards the close of the year have been announced, but by some city hall legendaries the departments have been maintained as usual and overlaps created, which were paid out of the following year's incomes. This left the two departments perpetually behind the game. Department Will Be Crisped.

If a reduction in the fire department is made the town will be at the mercy of flames and the department will be completely disorganized," said Fire Chief Satter. "We have been doing our best with insufficient appropriations for years and we can't do any more. Our small department is now stretched to the utmost limits. A reduction in force of one-half cannot be made without practically ruining it."

"A one-fourth cut will take off fifteen of our city patrolmen," said Chief of Police Donahue. "With a total of ninety-eight men the department is pushed to the limit all the time to police the town in any decent way." Mayor Moore has estimated a deficit of \$4,000 in the lighting fund. This being true a curtailment of both electric and gas lighting during November and December may be necessary.

TEST OF TRAIN MANAGEMENT

Unprecedented Travel to Denver Puts Officials on Their Mettle.

NO REST TIME FOR ROLLING STOCK

Extra Engines Standing with Steam Up at Colorado Capital Ready to Rush Back the Cars Needed Here.

The moving of the tens of thousands who are going to Denver in connection with the Grand Army of the Republic celebration shows to what perfection the handling of the business of a great railway system has been evolved. Both the Burlington and the Union Pacific are figuring on hauling in the neighborhood of 30,000 people each between the Missouri river and Denver between Wednesday of this week and next Monday inclusive. To do this will require an immense number of cars, as well as necessitating the use of the same cars two or three times. Engines stand ready at Denver with steam up to hustle the cars back to the Missouri river as soon as they are emptied.

The business will surpass all previous estimates, and it is daily increasing at an enormous rate. The Burlington had five sections of the Chicago and St. Louis fast Denver trains into Denver Wednesday night. There were four sections of No. 3 west of Oxford into Denver Thursday morning. The Burlington has also two sections of the through Chicago-Denver train enroute today. Two sections loaded to the guards of the St. Louis train and other southern points are also enroute to Denver. There were two sections of the train from the north into Denver Thursday morning, and two sections of No. 3 from Omaha Thursday afternoon, and also two sections of the St. Joseph train.

Nebraska Contributes Heavily.

The Union Pacific estimated that its Burlington line in Nebraska has an outside of Omaha will be turned over to the Union Pacific by the Northwestern, Chicago Great Western and Milwaukee, will demand three, four and five sections of No. 3 Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

The Massachusetts Grand Army of the Republic club special of twelve cars will arrive over the Northwestern Sunday and leave over the Union Pacific at 2 p. m. The Union Pacific will have from Omaha west the New York state Grand Army of the Republic special of fourteen cars and 200 people, leaving Omaha at 3 p. m. The Nebraska division of the Grand Army of the Republic will go west in second sections at 3 and 11 Sunday. Another special of eleven cars from the Milwaukee will leave over the Union Pacific at 4 p. m. Sunday.

A special from the Northwestern of thirteen cars and 200 people will leave Sunday at 2:30 p. m. A special from the Milwaukee of nineteen cars with the Grand Army of the Republic of Iowa and Minnesota will leave over the Union Pacific Friday at 2:30, going via Cheyenne, where a stop will be made on account of the Frontier day celebration. Colonel Burnham's party from Syracuse, N. Y., will arrive over the Milwaukee and leave over the Union Pacific Friday at 4:10. The New Hampshire delegation in two standard cars will leave over the Union Pacific Saturday at 4:10 p. m.

A coach from Millicoth, Mo., will arrive at 10:30 and leave over the Union Pacific at 4:10 Saturday. The South Dakota Grand Army of the Republic special will arrive in Omaha Monday over the Northwestern and Milwaukee and leave at 10:30 over the Union Pacific, returning after the encampment on the Burlington.

Trains in Bewildering Number.

Other trains which the Union Pacific will haul west are the Minnesota Grand Army of the Republic special of eight cars at 8:30 p. m. Saturday. This delegation is to return over the Burlington, the Cincinnati delegation in four sleepers at 8 p. m. Saturday, the Hoo Hoo Toronto delegation in one car Saturday morning, the Nebraska division with six extra cars on No. 3 Saturday afternoon, the Des Moines delegation in two cars Saturday afternoon, a special of fifteen cars from Omaha at 1:10 Saturday night, the Valparaiso delegation Sunday morning, the Rhode Island delegation Monday at 7:45 and the Brook, Ind., delegation Monday morning at the same time. All regular trains will run in two and three sections and a number of train will run over the Union Pacific September 4, consisting of twelve cars. The Woman's Relief corps will leave Omaha at 4:10 p. m. Monday in three special cars.

Department Commander Leit and staff will command the number of 1,000 which will go to Denver on the special train which will leave Omaha at 4:10 Monday afternoon and will leave Lincoln at 5:55. One tourist car will start from Grand Island, two from Fort, and one from Nebraska, and one from Hastings to help make up this official train.


