Monthly Circulation Statement.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1.—The monthly circulation statement issued by the comptroller of the currency shows that at the close of business August 31, 1905, the total circulation of national bank notes was \$512.250.367, an increase for the year of \$19, 705,194, and an increase for the month of \$3,285,972. The circulation based on United States bonds amounted to \$475,785,185, an increase for the year of \$61,865,855 and an increase for the month of \$7,170,184.

The circulation secured by lawful money aggregated \$21,354,202, a decrease for the year of \$1,202,71 and an increase for the month of \$1,078,578.

The amount of bonds on deposit to secure circulating notes was \$483,185,000, and to secure public deposits, \$57,097,300.
