The Modern Miller says: "In response to a special inquiry regarding stocks of wheat held by mills and elevators outside of the large markets, the helding position of farmers and the large acreage, replies were received from over 100 winter wheat millers located in ten states and two territories. Excepting one milling center in Tennesses and a few large mills elsewhere stocks of wheat are light and generally below what they were a year ago. Farmers are generally holding their grain because they are husy seeding or expect higher prices. In Missouri, Illinois, Michigan, Kentucky, Tennessee and Texas the winter acreage is estimated as about the same as last year. In Indiana, Ohlo, Kansas, Nebraska and the territories a larger acreage is probable."

The report further claimed that no movement of consequence is probable until the after-seeding is completed. In December the highest point of the day was reached at \$150. The market closed strong, with December at \$450. Chearances of wheat and flour were equal to 67,500 bushels. Exports for the week as shown by Bradstreets were equal to 1,600,000 bushels. Primary receipts were \$77,000 bushels, compared with \$25,000 bushels a year ago. Minneapolis, Duluth and Chicago reported receipts of \$25 cars, against \$25 cars last week and \$54 cars a year ago.

Advance in Money Rate Checks Attempt of Professionals to Lift Priess.

MARKET IS DULL AND SLUGGISH ALL DAY

Fight for Control of the Wabash System Causes Alarm Among Speculators-Effect of C. H. & D. Sale,

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—The money market situation asserted itself on stocks to-day and checked the efforts by professional operators to lift prices. The influence of the money situation was due more to the prospect of a poor bank statement than prospect of a poor bank statement than to any actual operations in the loan market, although the 4 per cent rate for money on call registered the maximum for the season thus far and served as an admonition of the actual scarcity of funds. Some of the news developments were of a character that would have been regarded as important at another time, but were overshadowed almost entirely by the money question.

The demonstration for wresting control of the Wabash system from its present hands caused a sharp advance in the securities of that company. But hostile demonstrations amongst owners and capitalists are not relished by stock market operators and the effect of the news on the general list became rather depressing than otherwise. There was a dreaft that the contest might vell a struggle between vast interests behind the nominal contestants which might cause disastrous consequences. Contrary inferences were drawn from the announcement of the passing of control of the Cincinnati, Hamilton & Dayton symem to J. P. Morgan & Co., as it was believed the effect would be harmonization of various claims. There was a disposition to drawn an analogy with the Louisville & Nashville purchase, regarding which Mr. Morgan made a statement on the witness stand that he was influenced by the purpose to keep it out of hands which he regarded as unsafe. The effect of this supposition had to do with the special strength of Chesapeake & Ohio, although rumors also were in circulation of an intention to increase the dividend on that stock. question.

Estimates of the week's currency movement differed widely, but only by the amount of their excess over the loss to the banks by the subtreasury absorption of funds. This had reached \$4.70,000 up to Thursday, with one more day to figure in the result as it will show in the bank statement. The variations in the estimate have to do with the additional losses by the banks through the movement by express with the interior. In any event the decline in cash runs far above the total surplus as it appeared in last week's bank statement. Another heavy loan contraction must be shown by the banks, therefore, in order to prevent the wiping out of the surplus. There has been no evidence of a withdrawal of credits from the stock market during the week and it is deemed probable, in fact, that some increase in loans has been made for use in the stock market. Confidence is felt, nevertheless, that the process of shifting of loans from banks to trust companies has been continued in sufficient volume to effect the necessary showing of loan reduction by the banks and the conservation of their reserves within the legal limit. Nothing developed from yesterday's rumors of further large gold engagements for import. A reduction in the price of copper was an incident of the day. The volume of sales underwent considerable shrinkage for the day and the duliness was progressive up to the close. The day's changes are mostly unimportant.
