AMERICAN ASSOCIATION CLOSES

Columbus Finishes in First Place, Winning One Hundred Games. KANSAS CITY, Sept. 18.—The American Association season ended here today. A game with Minneapolis, postponed yesterday, was to have been played today, but it was declared off on account of rain.

Chicago captured the pennant for 1905 with an easy victory. Although easily in the lead, the Ohio team made its final victory complete by taking the last game today. Columbus closed the season with 100 games to its credit and with only fifty-two lost.

The other clubs in the association finished in the order named: Milwaukee, Minneapolis, Louisville, St. Paul, Indianapolis, Toledo, Kansas City, Kansas City, St. Louis, Columbus. They went on an average of 20.1 games per team, but forty-four games and lost 300 ended the season nearly 100 points below Toledo.

Three World's Records Broken and One Driver Injured. SYRACUSE, N. Y., Sept. 18.—Nearly 4,000 persons saw the automobile races at the state fair track today under the auspices of the Automobile Club of Syracuse. Weather and track conditions were perfect.

The five-mile national championship race, participated in by Guy Vaughn, Dan Wurgis and M. T. Bernin, the heavy machine driven by Vaughn, at the rate of a mile in fifty seconds, skidded while rounding the lower turn of the track and the rear wheels smashed into a tree trunk, which was cut about the temple, but not seriously hurt.

Three world records were by the board. G. H. Curtiss of Hammondport, N. Y., breaking the motorcycle one and two-mile marks, flying start. In season, Curtiss and Dan Wurgis, in his thirty horse power Richfield clipping, fifth of a second on the world record for five mile trials, hitherto held by M. T. Bernin.

In return to the other for work of the afternoon, Barney Oldfield, in a five-mile exhibition, made the best time for the distance on a circular track that has been made this season.

In the five-mile open event George S. Saleman early established a safe lead and kept it to the end, finishing in 6:13. George C. Cook's thirty horse power was second, Perry driver.

The special match race between Barney Oldfield and Dan Wurgis, driving forty horse power machines, was won by Oldfield.

The second heat was a repetition of the first. Oldfield winning in 5:11. The event for single cylinder motor bikes was won by Guy Vaughn, who took thirty and Dan Wurgis, who took forty.

Barney Oldfield went a five-mile exhibition as follows: 0:55.4, 1:01.6, 2:47, 3:24.4, 4:58.

The special match race between Guy Vaughn and Dan Wurgis in forty horse power machines with Vaughn in 5:24. Wurgis finished in 5:36.4. In the mile record trials, in which Dan Wurgis broke the world record. Guy Vaughn made the mile in one minute, flat. Barney Oldfield's time was 0:55.4, his car being of a heavier type.

In the five-mile open for cars weighing 1,000 lbs. and under, Guy Vaughn was first, in 5:59.5. Second, Dan Wurgis, 6:13.4.
