When Reintroduced Will Cover Private Cars, Refrigerator Cars and Terminal Charges.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5 .- Railroad rate sislation was the topic of a long conferresentative Townsend of Michigan, one of the authors of the Esch-Townsend bill which was passed last winter by the house of representatives.

At the conclusion of the conference which lasted an hour and a quarter, Mr. Townsend said it was his purpose to have his bill in readiness for introduction in the house as soon as congress convenes.

"My effort now," said he, "is to make certain that it shall cover what is expected of it. It will embody my ideas, and at the same time I am quite sure it will represent accurately those of the president. "After making it perfectly clear that the

provisions of the measure apply to private cars, refrigerator cars and terminal charges, it will be my purpose through the measure to confer upon the Interstate Commerce commission the power to make its findings in any particular case effective within a reasonable time after they are announced, Efforts have been made to create the impression that it is the purpose of the advocates of this legislation to give the Interstate Commerce commission the authority to fix all the rates of a railroad.
