GAS METER STOLEN FROM KITCHEN

Thief Carries Away Prepayment Register from Vaughan Restaurant.

When Mrs. W. R. Vaughan, who con ducts, a small restaurant at 826 West Broadway, arose vesterday morning to prepare breakfast she was surprised to find that the gas stove failed to work. There was no gas, but it was some time before Mrs. Vaughan discovered the cause. Investigation showed that the meter was missing and that the gas had been turned off. The meter was a "prepayment" one. the supply of gas being obtained by dropping a quarter in the slot. As it had been ome time since the company had tapped the meter, it is supposed that there was quite a little sum of money in it. Mrs. Vaughan is at a loss to account for the disappearance of the meter, except on the that some enterprising individual carried it off during the night for the purpose of securing the money from it. The meter rested on a shelf in the little kitchen, near the ceiling, and the fact that the kitchen door leading into the back yard was found unlocked yesterday morning confirms Mrs. Vaughan's suspicions that the machine was stolen by some person

Mrs. Vaughan and her children sleep in a room adjoining the kitchen and she cannot understand how the thief managed to enter the place, turn off the gas and then detach the meter without arousing her. The gas company on being notified of the theft of the meter made a search of the creek bed and hanks back of the building, suspecting that the thief would, as soon as he secured the money from it, throw the meter away. No trace, however, of the missing meter could be found. The matter was reported to the police and they are now working on the case.
