SUTTON UPHOLDS THE CLERK

Court Decides Broadwell's Election Board Appointments Are According to Law.

ALTERNATIVE WRIT IS DISCHARGED

Socialists Do Not Get on Boards, as They Have No Candidates on the General Ticket.

In an oral opinion rendered Friday morning Judge Sutton held that Clerk of Courts Broadwell had complied with the law in the appointment of the election boards for the coming election in Douglas county. He discharged the alternative writ secured by the republican county committee and the clerk of courts is allowed to send out at once his notices to the judges and clerks appointed by him. In effect Judge Sutton held the candidates for governor on the various tickets constituted a "set" of officers in the eye of the law. He also said an examination of the vote showed the socialists would be entitled to one judge on the boards in the cities of Omaha and South Omaha, having cast more than 10 per cent of the total vote. Under the circumstances existing the socialists will not have representation on the boards, as they have no candidates on the county ticket. They failed to take advantage of the primary law to participate in the nomination of candidates and their appeal to the supreme court in the effort to get certain names on the official ballot is still undecided and probably will not be passed on until after the election. To a request of Mr. Burbank for leave to amend the petition in a certain particular Judge Sutton said he would grant the leave to amend if it was desired to get the matter squarely before the supreme court, but on the amended petition he would hold the same as he had in the decision just rendered.
