FIGURES ON SMALL GRAIN

State Bureau Estimates Wheat Yield at Forty-One Million Bushels ALMOST TEN MILLION OVER LAST YEAR

Talk of Bringing Suit Against Lincoln School Board for State Money Alleged to Have Been Drawn Illegally. (From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Nov. 1.—(Special.)—The State Bureau of Labor and Statistics today issued its report on the yield and value of wheat and oats for 1904. A perusal of the tables shows that the total production of winter wheat this year is 36,630,819 bushels at a value of \$25,641,233.30, and the production of spring wheat is 4,718,485 bushels with a value of \$2,529,692.95, making a total value of 41,349,936.25 bushels as compared with 31,825,860 bushels in 1904. The total value of the wheat crop this year is \$28,171,629.50 as compared with \$28,415,626.47 in 1904. The total acreage of wheat in the state as shown by the report is 2,091,871 acres as compared with 2,054,067 acres in 1904. The report shows that the average yield per acre of winter wheat was 23.03 bushels and of spring wheat 13.46 bushels. Clay county leads in production of winter wheat, its total being 1,786,780 bushels with Hamilton county a close second, producing 1,562,850 bushels. In the production of spring wheat Knox county leads with 386,088 bushels, having had an acreage of 4,318 and an average yield of 11.6 bushels per acre. Sheridan county ranks second with the production of spring wheat with 378,829 bushels to its credit. The county's acreage was 24,409 with an average yield of 15.5 bushels per acre and the value of the crop was \$264,872.30. The average yield for the state is considerably larger than in 1904, when it was 13.7 bushels per acre on the total wheat crop.
