Ballot Box Found in River. Attorney General Mayer stated tonight that he had received information of the recovery from the North river of certain ballot boxes used in the election of Tuesday last. He said the matter was under investigation. Attorney General Mayer left his office at midnight, saying expected developments had not taken place and that he would meet the voters at his remaining down town longer. Mr. Mayer refused to discuss the reported finding of the ballot boxes in the river, further than to say that such reports had come to him, it being said the boxes were picked up by a tug. A ballot box alleged to have been stolen and recovered by accident tonight was taken to District Attorney Jerome's office and closely examined.

"DON CARLOS" AND CHURCH. Mansfield's New Play Not a Reflection on Catholicism in Any Regard. Manager Burgess of the Boyd theater received the following telegram from Richard Mansfield last night, dated at New York: "Dear Mr. Burgess, I have presented my new play, 'Don Carlos.' Some evilly disposed person, actuated by a spirit of mischief or jealousy, has sent me an abusive letter in which he has said 'Don Carlos' is injurious to the Catholic church. No statement could be more ridiculous or further from the truth. 'Don Carlos' was written 13 years ago by the great poet Schiller and has been played since then on the most famous stages of Europe. It is a historical tragedy by a great poet on account of a political organization, Roman Catholic or otherwise, which has long since ceased to exist."

MISS SHEDLOCK WILL COME. Kindergarten Godmother Secured by Teachers' Aid Association for Two Lectures. It has been announced that the Omaha Teachers' Annuity and Aid society has secured Miss Marie L. Shedlock for four lectures on the 29th and 30th insts. Miss Shedlock has an international reputation as a story-teller, her specialty being kindergarten stories. She has been nicknamed the "Kindergarten Godmother." Miss Shedlock is making a tour of the United States. One of her subjects here will be "The Art of Story-telling." Members of the local teachers' association feel that they have secured an unusual attraction in the appearance of Miss Shedlock. Two of her lectures will be for the little folks and two for the older people. A striking illustration of the woman's gifts as a story-teller for children occurred some time ago at St. Louis, where she talked to the kindergarten classes of the city. When she was through talking one of the tots was heard to remark with all of a child's sincerity, "Can we catch her?" Miss Shedlock has made a life study of child nature.

DELACY MARRIAGE ANNULLED. Union of Omaha Girl to Man Now Fugitive Rendered Void by Court. Judge Troup has pronounced null and void the marriage of Luella Schaefer to Harry Delacy. This marriage was contracted in Omaha a few hours before Delacy was arrested early last summer at the Grand Hotel in Council Bluffs, where he had taken his bride. Mrs. Delacy is allowed to resume her maiden name. Delacy is one of the men who escaped from the county jail here a few days before the primary in September. He has never been recaptured, nor have three others who got away at the same time. One of the five who escaped, Hugh Ward, was recaptured and is now serving time. At the time of his escape Delacy was awaiting trial on the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, as the putative agent of an eastern investment company.

PRINCE LOUIS IN NEW YORK. Grand Display of Fighting Ships Marks Arrival of Admiral. OBSERVES THE BIRTHDAY OF THE KING. Flags Fly and National Salute is Fired by Combined Fleet in Honor of British Holidays. NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Thousands stood and watched on the banks of the Hudson river at noon today while six British warships in union with double that number of American men-of-war fired a national salute of twenty-one guns in honor of King Edward, who celebrated today his sixty-fourth birthday anniversary. Banded from stem to stern with gaily fluttering flags of many colors, the column of ships stretched for four miles up the Hudson, from Forty-second to One Hundred and Twenty-fifth streets, by far the largest and most formidable Anglo-American naval force ever assembled in a home or a foreign port.

lating boxes and thought there was nothing to do but await the opening of the board's office and let President Voorhees decide what to do with the 8,000 ballot boxes. Hears of Proposed Fraud. It was said this morning that the sudden move made by Mr. Hearst last night followed a report by him that a printing company had been at work Tuesday night printing ballots. The report was further to the effect that the ballot boxes were to be opened while in the hands of the police and stuffed. Mr. Hearst decided to act at once. The order secured from Judge Gaynor directed the police commissioner and all his subordinates in the division to turn over to the board of elections forthwith all ballot boxes containing ballots and stubs of ballots, and also to file with the county clerk before noon today all envelopes containing tally sheets, inspectors' returns, defective ballots and ballots marked for identification. The order was issued on the affidavit of Mr. Hearst himself. The affidavit states Mr. Hearst's belief that he received a plurality of the votes, but that, according to the returns, 3,000 more votes than he himself received were counted for Mr. McClellan. Captain Cruise read the order to Commissioner McAdoo over the telephone. The commissioner's reply was an order to the captain directing him to read the Gaynor order over the telephone to the captain. Voorhis Refuses to Take Boxes. John Voorhis, president of the board of elections, refused early today to receive the official ballot boxes. Before refusing he consulted Police Commissioner McAdoo. Attorney General Mayer, Corporation Counsel DeLoach and Superintendent of Elections Morgan were notified of the situation and the boxes were kept in the police wagons in front of the office of the Board of Elections, pending a decision by the corporation counsel. Mr. Voorhis said that the New York state supreme court had in a recent decision, that the Board of Elections is not the proper custodian of the boxes, but that the police are. Mr. Voorhis is a democrat and president of the Board of Elections. After he had declined to leave the home and go to the
