CANDIDATES OUT IN DROVES

Army of Political Aspirants is Steadily Increasing Each Day. SHARP FIGHTS IN SPRING IMMINENT

Each Party Has Quota of Men After Mayor's Chair and Desires Want to Sit in Council.

OMAHA LEADS IN BUILDING

Makes Greater Per Cent of Increase in October Than Any American City. TWO HUNDRED AND TWENTY-NINE

Construction News of Chicago Calls Attention to Omaha's Progress as Most Significant Feature of All.

According to figures compiled by Construction News of Chicago, Omaha leads the country in point of gain in building operations during October over the same month last year.

Building construction in all parts of the country for October shows an increase of 14 per cent as compared with the corresponding month a year ago, but there is a slight falling off in the proportion of gain in Omaha.

It is interesting to note that in the larger cities in the list the figures are practically the same, with the exception of two instances. New York shows a loss of 3 per cent.
