CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—Excellent demand for cash wheat at Minneapolis almost offset in the wheat market today the effect of lower prices at Liverpool. Toward noon sentiment changed, feeling in the pit becoming more favorable to the buying side. After touching 83%s the May option advanced to 83%s on covering by shorts. Reports of active demand for flour led many shorts to buy in their lines. Most of the flour was said to be for home consumption. It was reported that northwestern millers were so eager to secure wheat that they were willing to pay fancy prices. At Minneapolis No. 1 northern sold at a premium of 2623%c over December and all offerings were quickly absorbed at the advanced price. Lower grades showed equal strength. The brief time remaining before the close of lake navigation was given as one reason for the urgent demand from the millers. The market cased off a triffe during the last hour on renewed selling by pit traders. The close was casy with May at 88%c. Clearances of wheat and flour were equal to 343,000 by. Primary receipts were 1,456,000 by. compared with all chicago reported receipts of 839 cars, against 984 cars last week and 555 cars a year ago.
