Danish Editor Flees to America to Escape Arrest on Nicholas' Order.

WRITES IN SYMPATHY WITH FINNS

Impressed with Educational and Commercial Advantages to Rich and Poor Alike in the United States.

Emil Opfer, an exile from Denmark, because of his articles on the conditions of the Russians and the Russian government and his sympathy for the Finns, is in Omaha on a tour of the country studying American industries and affairs.

When the order for his arrest came Opfer was editor of the "Klokkan 12," a daily paper published at Copenhagen.

Since that time he has made a contract with a number of Russian and Danish papers for contributions on conditions in America, and in Russia, and he is now touring the country to get his information.

"Russia is in a pitiful condition," said Mr. Opfer, "but under the leadership of Witte I firmly believe a good government will be established."

"I visited the Omaha High school Saturday and the things I saw were a revelation to me. I was particularly impressed with the sanitary construction of the building and its conveniences. And more was

I impressed with the fact that it is a poor man's school as well as a school for the rich. It is the general impression in the old country that the United States is so busy making money its people have no time to devote to educational or charitable pursuits.

"I made a trip around the world in 1891, and upon my return I said I would prefer to live in California than any other place except home, but the more I see of the United States the more I am impressed that any place in its borders is a good place.

Mr. Opfer will leave Omaha Tuesday afternoon.

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PRESSMEN TIRE OF LONG DAY

Another Union Wants to Get in Line for Eight Hours and Closed Shop.

The union printing pressmen of Omaha in a meeting held last night adopted a resolution calling upon the pressmen's national union to abrogate its contract with employers for a nine-hour day, which is in force until 1907.

Whereas, The agreement now existing between the United Typographic Union and the International Printing Pressmen and Assistants' union is an agreement of a nature in direct violation of trade union principles, and

Whereas, Said agreement will have a tendency to place members of our craft in an unfair position between now and January, 1906, as said agreement denies us the right to assist the Omaha craft in securing a reduction in hours of labor as well as for the members of our craft, and

Whereas, We believe many locals of the International Printing Pressmen and Assistants' union can establish the eight hour day on January 1, 1906, in cooperation with the International Typographic union and

Whereas, The methods pursued by the International Typographic union in the past year toward the entire printing craft demonstrated the fact that said organization is trying to disrupt the unions of the printing trades,

Therefore, be it resolved, That we, the Omaha Printing Pressmen No. 35 of North America, demand the board of directors of the International Printing Pressmen and Assistants' union to individually proceed to obtain the complete abrogation of the agreement now existing between the International Typographic of America and the International Printing Pressmen and Assistants' Union of North America, such abrogation not to be later than December 1, 1905.

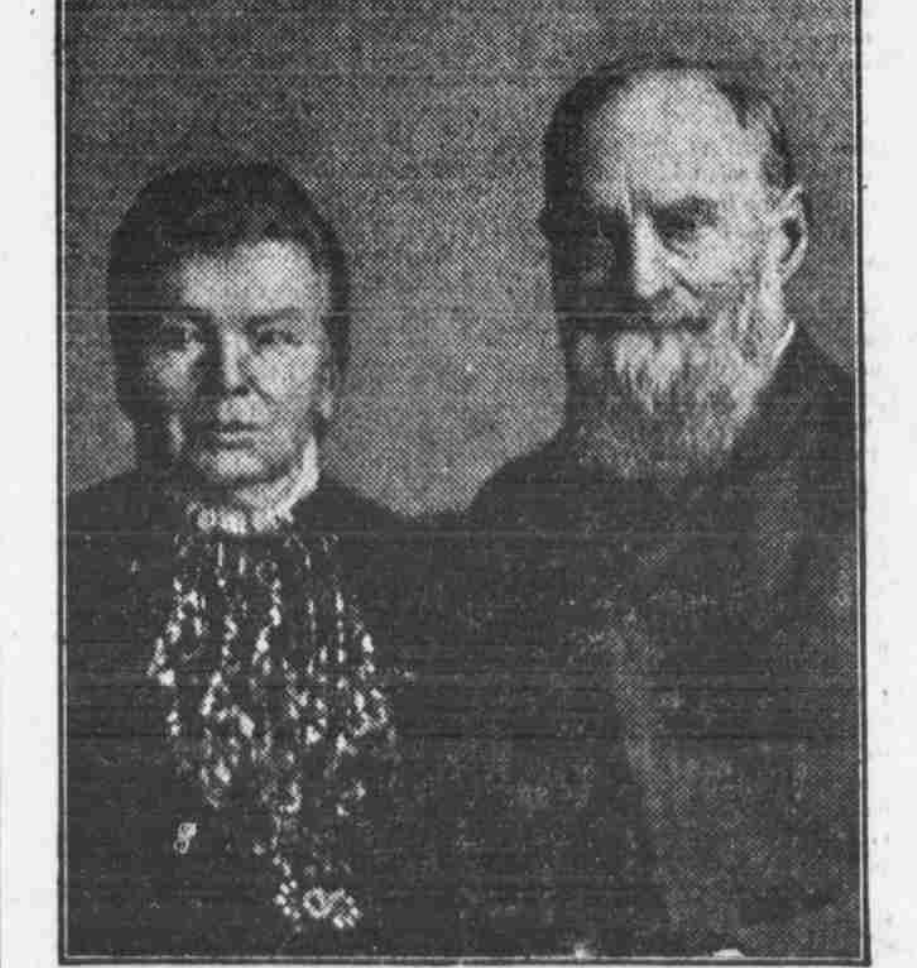
The same resolution has already been adopted by the Toledo pressmen and it is expected to be adopted by all pressmen's unions within a short time.

The local union also assessed each member a percentage of his weekly wages to assist the printers.
