pasium is to be sixty feet in length and thirty feet in width, with a ceiling sixteen feet six inches high. Corrugated iron is to be used on the outside and a gravel roof is planned. The interior of the gymnasium to be celled, steam heated and electric lighted. A passageway will connect the gymnasium with the main building.

The basement of the main building is to be cut up so as to provide a boys' room, a kitchen, shower baths, toilet rooms and lockers. On the ground floor there will open from

the entrance a lobby twenty by twentyfour feet, and a public and private office Two reading and class rooms, each eigh teen by twenty feet, and connected by aliding doors, are planned. A space for a lavstory is provided on this floor.

At least \$2,500 will be needed to fit up th proposed new quarters and construct the symnasium building. This money should secured not later than the last day of this month. By enlarging the accommoda-Hons between 100 and 200 additional members can be accommodated.
