BULLET GETS THE PENSION Minie Ball Found in Remains Proves Man Was Shot and

Died as Result.

C. E. Wheeler, a wen known lawyer of Cedar Rapids, Ia., spent Thanksgiving in Omaha and related a strange incident of the finding of a bullet in the grave of a reteran soldler which was the means of securing a long deferred penalon to his widow.

"The dead soldier, Evans by name, had seen wounded in one of the western battles with a minic ball just below the right shoulder," said Mr. Wheeler. "The bullet remained in the body, but Evans was a youngster at the time, in the prime of physical vigor, and aside from a week or so in the hospital, the wound did not seriously discommode him. He continued in the service until his enlistment expired at the close of the war, when he returned home and married. A few years following his marriage he was stricken with a peculiar disease, which had the effect of causing him to grow thin and his appearance mottled and sallow, eventually causing him to turn to a yellowish brown color. His health otherwise was fairly good, but he dled suddenly about three weeks after his Illness first set in.

"His widow put in a claim for a pension within a reascrable time after his death in which who mai tained that his death was the result of an old wound. Special examiners looked into the case and decided that Evans death was due to natural causes and the pension was denied the widow, who, it was shown, had an income sufficient to bar her from a dependent pension. Matters ran on for many years, the widow still insisting her husband's death was due to his wound. So persistent was her claim the pension depai, ment finally sent a special examiner to Cocar Rapids a year or two ago to disinter the body of the soldier. The casket was in a fair state of preservation, and while the body was much decayed, a careful investigation revealed the presence of an ounce minie bullet, encased in a fragment of the dead man's liver, which was shown conclusively to have been the cause or his death. The widow soon was granted the pension claimed. Thus had this bullet, after a lapse of thirty-three years, come to the front as a mute witness of the seidier's
