St. Paul Roller Milla PAUL, Nob., Dec. 11 .- (Special.) Early this * morning, between 2 and 3 o'clock, fire broke out in the St. Paul Milling and Grain company's roller mill in this city. The fife, which originated in the engine room, was fanned by a high gale and spread so fapidly that the fire eral Bates, though a final officiation has not department was powerless to cope with it and in a short time the large mill building been in command of the Northern division and the adjoining warehouse were burned to the ground. The valuation of the entire plant was about \$12,000 and there was \$5,000 or \$6,000 worth of stock in the building, none of which was saved. The insurance was very low, only \$5,000 on mill building and machinery and \$800 on the warehouse, and none whatever on the stock. This entails a very heavy loss on Murray Haywood, the principal owner of the business, and the destruction of the mill is a general loss to the community. For more than twenty years this mill has been among the leading ones of the state and was at the present time doing a large and growing business.

In regard to the alleged unlawful enclosures of public lands, fraudulent entries and illegal cutting of timber on the public domain, the report shows that during the year nearly 1,600 entries were suspended upon reports of special agents and that 1,500 entries were cancelled as a result of these and prior proceedings. Reports from special agents showed unlawful enclosures of public lands in more than 100 instances, the sarea of such enclosures aggregating 363,377 acres of public lands. Through the efforts of the land office and special agents sixty-nine unlawful enclosures have been removed and proceedings are pending to compel the removal of fences in the remaining cases reported. There were pending in the courts on July 1, 1905, sixty-six
