ECONOMY IN LAND OFFICE

Recommendation that Office of Receiver of Public Lands Be Abolished. SEVENTEEN MILLION ACRES DISPOSED OF

Thousand Entries Suspended and Fifteen Hundred Cancelled as Result of Special Investigations.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—In his annual report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1935, the commissioner of the general land office recommends that the office of receiver of public lands be abolished, as it is deemed unnecessary to have an office of consolidation jurisdiction in local land offices. The proposed action, it is stated, would result in an estimated saving of \$30,000 per annum and an improvement in the handling of public business in local land offices.

During the year 17,066,422 acres of the public lands were disposed of. The receipts from all sources aggregated \$1,015,311 and aggregate expenditures and estimated liabilities for the public land service \$1,088,339. There were issued 191 patents to railroads, with an area of 1,453,428 acres.

In regard to the alleged unlawful enclosures of public lands, fraudulent entries and illegal cutting of timber on the public domain, the report shows that during the year nearly 1,600 entries were suspended upon reports of special agents and that 1,200 entries were cancelled as a result of these and prior proceedings. Reports from special agents showed that 1,200 entries of public lands in more than 100 instances, the areas of such enclosures aggregating 262,377 acres of public lands. Through the action of the land office and special agents sixty-nine unlawful enclosures have been removed and proceedings are pending to cancel 1,200 entries in 120 to 150 remaining cases reported. There were pending in the courts on July 1, 1935, sixty-six civil suits for the recovery of \$1,550,803.

Included in the report and approved by the commissioner is the second partial report of the Public Lands commission, which recommends the repeal of the timber and stone laws, a modification of the desert land law by repealing the provisions permitting the assignment of such entries, limiting the area of each entry to 160 acres and requiring a certain period of residence on such claims. A plan also was suggested to remove the public grazing lands available to the public by lease and governmental control.

Director of Census Reports. The report of the director of the census office, made public today, calls attention to the great progressive increase in the cost of the work, the per capita cost having risen from 10 cents in 1920 to 100 cents in 1930. The time seems to have arrived, he says, when in planning the next decennial census the aim must be to reduce rather than to extend the minutiae of detail presented.

The director speaks of the system of determining the size of the annual cotton crop by counting as it comes from the gin. "This system," he says, "has now proved to be the most trustworthy method of securing this important information."

Under the head of future and suggested work, the director recommends the adoption of a report upon the electrical industries of the country at five-year intervals. "Nothing," he says, "so rapid, so striking, so revolutionary in its effects upon private manufacturing and public utilities as the application of electricity to power and heating has been witnessed in industrial history."

The suggestion is made that decennial reports be authorized upon life, fire and marine insurances, savings banks, cooperative banks, mortgage, loan and investment companies and similar institutions. "The statistics," he says, "are more important than any of these additional inquiries into judicial statistics, which, he says, would open a field of statistical research heretofore wholly neglected in this country. Such statistics, he says, would include the records of homicide, felonies, misdemeanors and other punishable offenses. Such an undertaking, he declares, would tend to produce uniformity of the codes of laws relating to crimes and misdemeanors in the various states, which now differ greatly.

Prison for Rebutlers. Representative Sheppard of Texas introduced a bill today which restores the imprisonment penalty for violations of the Interstate Commerce act. Under the Elkins amendment the only penalties for the violation of the act is a fine and the Sheppard bill seeks to impose the penalties provided for originally by the Interstate Commerce act.

Representative Honoyne of Colorado introduced a bill for the restriction of immigration, fixing a head tax of \$10 on immigrants and using this money to defray the expense of regulating immigration. Honoyne introduced a bill to enable President Roosevelt to call a conference to secure an agreement for an international regulation of immigration.

Two Liquor Bills in House. Two liquor bills were introduced today by Representative Bowie of Alabama. One prevents the leasing of United States liquor licenses in prohibition districts and the other requires collectors of internal revenue to furnish prosecuting attorneys with information concerning persons to whom government liquor stamps have been issued.
