



SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 18.-The Central American coffee crop, estimated at 500,000 sheks, and which will average nine sacks to the ton is aboth ready to be moved and the Pacific Mail officials are somewhat worried over whether they will be able to control the shipment of most of it The bulk of the coffee usually goes to Europe via the Pacific Mail, Panama road and Atlantic steamer connection at Colon But this year there is a big congestion of freight on the Panama road. If the latter is not able to handle this season's grop promptly most of it may go all the way by water in the steamers of the Kosmos line and by tramp steamers. It is understood that the Pacific Mail is endeavoring to secure from the Panama road some kind of assurances that it will undertake to transport Central American coffee shipments to the exclusion of
