When the officers of the Merchants' Trust company decided to suspend business Chancellor Heiskel was asked to appoint a receiver for the institution and named John his check books, but Hamilton refused to P. The Merchants' Trust company recently absorbed the Memphis National bank and, it McCall did, however, get a statement from is stated, owns the controlling stock of Hamilton regarding the expenditures of the American Savings Bank and Trust comabsorbed the Mechanics' Savings bank.

The suspension of the three institution caused little excitement in financial circles. It was later learned that the American Savings Bank and Trust company had actually absorbed the Mechanics Savings bank several days ago.

It was stated today that the suspension of this institution is only temporary and that its affairs are in good shape. Officers say that the suspension was decided upon because they feared a pun when the doors were opened this morning, the public generally being aware of the bank's relation to the Merchants' Trust company.

At the latter institution it was said that thorough investigation would be made and hope is expressed that the bank would again open its doors for business in a short time.

A condensed statement of the condition of the Merchants Trust company at the close of business December 26 was given out as follows: Total assets, \$3.665,665; in debtedness of every character to depositors, \$2,132,319; all other obligations, exclusive of capital stock, \$889,668; cash actually on hand, \$30,000.

SITUATION WORST IN BALTIC PROVINCES

Insurgents Seem to Have Entire Control and It Will Be Necessary to Reconquer the Territory.

ST PETERSBURG, Dec. 27.-11:36 p. m .-There is no further news from Moscow tonight. The Associated Press correspondent to tell you a horrible story" when he was

Revolt Planned in Poland. According to information received by the revolutionary leaders here, an armed rebeliion on a large scale has been planned in Poland. The socialist revolutionaries, incouraged by the success of the insurgents in the Baltic provinces and of the situation at Moscow and in Russia generally, have decided that the moment has come to try to cast off the yoke of the

autogracy. The tactics to be followed are the same s those adopted at Moscow, the rising to be preceded by a general strike, which already has practically come into operation, bringing about half the railroads in Poland to a standstill.

An open rebellion in Poland would immensely complicate the situation for the government, for if it should gain sufficient headway to warrant reasonable hope of success it would probably draw in the enthe population and the government would have to reconquer the country. Expects to Crush Revolt.

An inspired statement in the Slove today says the government expects the revolt at Moscow to be completely crushed within four days. The duration of the rising is explained by the small number of troops available. Many of the soldiers necessarily were employed in guarding the government buildings, leaving a comparatively small number available to cope with the insurgents over the wide area of the disturb ances. Fresh troops have now arrived and the end is said to be near. The Slove says:

The grenadiers have wiped out the stain

on their honor with blood, fighting in the front ranks at their own request. From an independent source the Slove de clures it has learned that the bloodshed at Moscow has been frightful and that the casualties will reach 15,600 and that about 100 Red Cross workers have been dispatched from St. Petersburg to Moscow to aid in caring for the wounded. The paper also says it has learned that the arms of the revolutionists mostly came from Germany and Belgium, whence they were shipped to England, transhipped and smug-

gled into Russia through Finland and the Baltic provinces.

Consuls Refuse to Act. Continuing, the Slovo remarks: "When our plenipotentiary sought to prevent the sailing of those vessels through the consuls the latter refused to act, us all the vessels

flew foreign flags" The information of other papers is that while admitting that the revolutionists are showing signs of exhaustion they do not regard the issue as decided. The Molva (Russ), which reappeared today, fans the flames by holding out encouragement of the success of the revolt. The paper declares that the area of highting is increasing instead of diminishing, and asserts that the insurgents are helding six miles of barricader. "Even if the revolt fails now," the Malva says, "it will be recommenced

in January or February." This also is the view of the revolutionary leaders here who, however, have not yet given up hope of success. In any case they assert they can in the meantime keep the government engaged in suppressing continual uprisings from place to place, believing that each city and town should have its haptism of blood as a preparation

for the final upheaval. In spite of the bad prospects here the leaders of the revolutionists are continuing their desperate efforts to bring on a gen-
