

GRAIN MEN SHORT ON CARS

Small Jobbers Charge Railroads with Favoring Lise Elevator Firms.

NORTHWESTERN AND BIG DEALERS DENY IT

Omahans Interested in Announcement Iowa Railroad Commission Will Investigate Charges Made at Council Bluffs.

Independent elevator men of the state are claiming that in the present war shortage the big dealers are being favored by the railroads, while the little fellows are unable to get scarcely any cars.

Charles T. Peavey, vice president of the Worrall Grain company, received a call this week from a small dealer with elevators on the Northwestern. This man said his house was full and he could get no cars to move his grain, while the elevators of the big companies were shipping every day.

Statement is Denied. The truth of his statement was denied at the office of John A. Kubn, assistant general freight agent of the Northwestern. No such order had ever been issued, said the chief clerk, and all companies were given their pro rata allotment of cars, regardless of their position.

Omahans are much interested in the announcement that the Iowa railroad commission is soon to visit Council Bluffs to investigate the alleged claims of dealers throughout Iowa that they are unable to secure grain cars, while the large Omaha and Council Bluffs houses are getting all they want.
