## CONDITION OF OMAHA'S TRADE

Local Wholesalers Getting Good Start After Holidays.

BIG BUSINESS FOR YEAR'S FIRST WEEK

### January is Expected to Be a Record Breaker-Retailers Have Money and Collections Are Good

with Jobbers.

For the last week the wholesalers have not been pushing hard for business. In-voices were taken by most jobbers early in the week, and since then they have been o then they have been Owing to the holfin the week, and since then they are busy with pricing. Owing to the holl-days, salesmen did not get cut on the road until the middle of the week. Orders sent in by them are larger and more numerous than is usual for this time, and the lobbers feel that the business for the menth will be a record breaker for Janzara.

Collections have been good. Retailers in the country enjoyed a good holiday trada, and with the closing up of their accounts for the year have plenty of money to meet their bills in Omana.

Sugar was strong for the week, raws having advanced sharply. Wet weather continues in Cuba, retarding grinding, and the indications are for higher prices before the crop is marketed. As a result of the advance in raws, New York refiners have advanced all grades of refined sugars life a hundred. This will no doubt be followed by an advance in the south and west.

The cheese market has remained nom-

cheese market has remained nom-Desirable skims are not overplenti-

inal. Desirable skims are not overplentiful.

The first week of the year has seen a quiet market in sait fish. Prices are well maintained at prevailing high figures.

The official figures on the sardine pack have not been made public, but it is certain that it will exceed any of recent years. One reliable estimate made is 1,830,000 cases, which is about 200,000 cases larger than last year.

Rice has been moving rapidly for the last thirty days. Jobbers look for a general improvement in prices in this line and expect to see both head rice and Japans considerably higher before the new crop is on the market. Advices from the south report a firm tone on the Atlantic coast and at New Orieans.

### Strength in Tomatoes.

Strength in Tomatoes.

Outside of tomatoes there is little interest and little change of prices in the canned goods line. A strong interest has been shown in tomatoes for thirty days, and the Baltimore market has steadily increased until Friday. They are now held at 250 per dozen higher than the basis of values December i. On account of this increase in values California goods are coming forward and can be landed at somewhat less than the eastern packs. Gallons also are taking on additional strength. The general position is one of exceptional strength, and a further rise in values is freely predicted.

Coffee was strong for the week on the large decrease in the visible supply for the month of December. It was 42.54 bags, and it was expected to be only about 250,000 bags. The total movement for December was 793,000 bags. Estimated receipts for January are 575,000 bags, against 572,000 bags last year for the same month. There will be a steady decrease in the supply now until July, when the new crop comes on. Although the castern trade papers quote 7s at 84c, Omaha Jobbers have been unable to get any offerings at less than 85c. The Journal of Commerce contains some talk that if the Brazillan government puts an export duty on coffee Rossevelt will favor an import duty.

In peas the market offers little feature. Stock of desirable grade is in close compass and firmly held. Packers selling at the principal producing points report the lightest stocks in first hands for a number of years. Corn is in fair shape under an increased consumptive demand, due to exceptionally low prices ruling.

The entire line of dried fruits, with the possible exception of raisins, is in stronger position than ever. Prunes have been marked up ½c in the last thirty days, Higher prices are freely predicted and will doubtless come with the heavy demand for fruit in the spring. Apricots and peaches are firm, without large movement. Raisins are weak and there is a strong disposition to urge sales.
