CONDITIONS OF THE TRADE

Local Wholesalers Getting Good Start After Holidays. BIG BUSINESS FOR YEAR'S FIRST WEEK. January is expected to be a record breaker—Retailers Have Money and Collections are Good with Jobbers.

For the last week the wholesalers have not been pushing hard for business. Invoices were taken by the jobbers early in the week, and since then they have been busy with pricing. Owing to the holidays, salesmen in the middle of the week, orders sent in by them are larger and more numerous than in any other part of the month.

Collections have been good. Retailers in the country enjoyed a good holiday trade, and with the closing up of their accounts for the year have plenty of money to meet their bills in Omaha.

Sugar was quiet for the week, raws having advanced sharply. Wet weather in Cuba, retarding growing and the indications are for higher prices before the crop is marketed. As a result of the advance in raws, New York has raised its price for refined sugar to 100 a hundred. This will not doubt be followed by an advance in the south west.

The cheese market has remained nominal. Desirable skims are not overplentiful. The first week of the year has seen a quiet market in salt fish. Prices are well maintained at prevailing high figures.

The official figures on the marine pack have been in the visible supply for a certain that it will exceed any of recent years. One reliable estimate makes it 25,000 cases, valued at \$2,000,000, as against 20,000 cases last year.
